



Rev. John Long (1814-1905)

The Rev. Rebecca A. Barnes from St Luke's Episcopal Church in Scranton sent the picture of the Rev. John Long, St Paul's 7th rector. Rev. Long came to St. Paul's in 1845 at the age of 31 and left in 1852 to establish St. Luke's in Scranton. While at St. Paul's he married a Montrose girl and "with his own hands" built the first rectory. The house is still standing at the corner of Cherry and Cedar Streets.



St. Paul's First Rectory

A couple of weeks ago, we printed a picture of St. Paul's 7th rector, the Rev. John Long (1814-1905). Long has been credited with building our first rectory "with his own hands" at the corner of Cedar and Cherry Street. Called a parsonage at that time, it was started in 1850 and "completed and improved" in 1855. Several people inquired where the rectory was. Here is a picture. The house is remarkably unchanged since it was build. It's address is 403 Cherry St.
