The Book of Remembrance is a book in which are written, each year, the names of faithful members of each parish who entered into life eternal and for whom a memorial thank offering has been made. The Book of Remembrance was established in 1938 in loving memory of Ruth May Linderman, treasurer of the Women's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Bethlehem from 1913 until 1938. The Book of Remembrance is placed on the altar for the noon time service on the last day of the Annual Diocesan Convention, and all the names that are entered for the current year are read aloud. #### St. Paul's Bell

A climb up two sets of long ladders, one fairly rickety, in St. Paul's bell tower brings you to where our bell sits - not a trip for the timid. There are no foundry marks on it but church papers infer it was cast in Scranton. It does have a patent date of 1858. It rings in two ways, operated by ropes that hang down to the bell tower entrance: the first, operated by a large wheel, is used for joyous occasions - one pull will ring it several times; the other pulls a hammer that sits inside the bell and only rings once and is used for more somber occasions.

St. Paul's did not obtain the bell until two years after the present 1857 church was built. Although construction of a bell tower was specified in the contract for the original 1832 church at Chestnut and Cedar Streets, the church still had no bell by 1851. The Presbyterian Meeting House obtained its bell that year and the *Susquehanna Register* in mentioning its acquisition noted that the Episcopal, Methodist and Universalist meeting houses were "as yet still destitute."

Rev. William F. Halsey, who served as St. Paul's 10th rector from 1858 to 1866, noted the bell's acquisition at the May 1860 Episcopal Convention in Philadelphia: "since the last Convention, a new bell has been procured and suspended in the tower of the Church." The new bell was discussed in the December 29, 1859 Montrose *Independent Republican*. The article noted that St. Paul's "has been without that useful appendage" and that it weighed over 1,000 pounds. It was first rung Christmas Eve 1859.

Although almost 160 years old, it is still rung at weddings, funerals and to start our church service.
