Ever Wondered What Lent Is or What Those Ashes Mean?

Lent is the six-week period leading up to Easter. It is one of the most important times of year for many Christians around the world. Lent is generally seen as a time of solemn preparation for the observance of the death of Jesus on Good Friday and His resurrection on Easter. From its start on Ash Wednesday until its end on Easter Sunday, Lent is a traditional time for fasting and prayer. Many follow a routine of giving something up or adding something positive (such as Bible reading) to their daily life. Just as we carefully prepare for events such as weddings or birthdays in our personal lives, Lent invites us to make our minds and hearts ready for remembering Jesus' life, death and resurrection. Ashes imposed on the forehead (which is optional) symbolize human mortality and a call to repentance, i.e., to live according to God's ways.

Lenten Bible Study Begins

Please join us for any or all parts of each Tuesday evening in Lent. We begin our evening with reading the Stations of the Cross in the sanctuary at 5 p.m. This is a beautiful tradition of reading, quiet reflection, and prayer as we use the carved images of Christ's passion on the church walls to focus our thoughts. At 5:30 p.m we sit down to a simple supper of soup, salad and bread which is provided by volunteers on a rotating basis. The fellowship is fun and it's a great opportunity to taste some new and different soups. After our meal, we begin a Bible study, again, led by volunteers on a rotating basis. The lessons are printed out in advance and they offer guidance in leading the study and questions for the group to discuss. You may bring a Bible or use one from the shelves in the Guild Room. The study is not too academic or intimidating but offers us a chance to discuss how our lives relate to the scripture verses. There are no right or wrong comments and, if you are new to reading the Bible, this session is a great introduction with friends you can trust.

Centering Prayer is Alive and Well

Be still and know that I am God. Psalm 46:10

In the fall we made the conscious decision to re-think our practice of holding Centering Prayer in the sanctuary at noon on Wednesdays. Now, in the penitential season of Lent, we hope to encourage folks to join us in prayer at noon on Wednesdays in their homes or places of work. We will come together in the church for prayer at noon on the Wednesday of Holy Week and thereafter on the last Wednesday of the month.

The following are four guidelines to Centering Prayer:

- 1. Choose a sacred word as the symbol of your intention to consent to God's presence and action within.
- 2. Sitting comfortably with eyes close, settle briefly and silently introduce the sacred word as the symbol of your consent to God's presence and action within.
- 3. When engaged with your thoughts (including body sensations, feelings, images, and reflections) return ever so gently to the sacred word.
- 4. At the end of the prayer period (20 minutes is suggested), remain in silence with eyes closed for a couple of minutes.

During your prayer time, think of each "thought interruption" as an opportunity to return to God.

On Ash Wednesday, we are invited to the observance of a Holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word. Centering Prayer offers quiet time to sit with God.
