

I've also learned something about myself. All those things I said I would do when I had the time, well apparently time was not the issue. I have not cleaned out any drawers or closets. The drawer full of family pictures that I need to organize is still full. My little painting project in the hallway is unfinished. I guess I need to work to a deadline, and right now, I have none. If someone would announce that we would be out of lockdown on such and such a date, I could kick into gear.

We all handle stress differently. We need to be understanding of one another and acknowledge that the impact of the coronavirus is different on each of us. We are apart, but not alone. Please keep in touch with your church family. Call, write, email, or text several people in the directory. Listen to them. Tell a joke—laughter is great medicine. For someone who lives alone, hearing another voice is his/her connection to the outside world. But most of all, pray. Pray for those on the front lines, the essential workers, those who put themselves in harm's way every day for our benefit. Pray for those who are ill, especially Fr. Arthur, Mother Jenny, and Joe.

I so look forward to the day when we can join physically in church to worship, to thank God for being with us during the health crisis, and to celebrate with a party!! That will be a deadline I welcome.
