As most of us know, Evie and Skip Constantine join us on many Sundays for worship during the summer. Evie's sister, Peg, frequently accompanied her. Unbeknownst to me when I asked Evie to write a message for the update, Peg passed away on July 10. Evie has been overwhelmed with sadness, but sent a few thoughts to share.

"St. Paul's is my home away from home. Everyone at St. Paul's is very friendly and caring. We both enjoyed helping out with your pancake supper. My sister, Peg, loved our lake house and always enjoyed services at St. Paul's. We also enjoyed St. Matthew's services."

During this time of pandemic, we all feel a sense of loss—loss of control, loss of "normalcy", loss of human touch. Death of a loved one at this time just compounds the

profound grief we carry in our hearts for the loss of what we took for granted.

Who ever thought it would be "normal" to walk into the grocery store and see everyone wearing masks? We adjust to these safety measures out of love, caring, and compassion for our fellow humans. Masks still feel strange and sometimes I have to walk back to the car to get my mask because it isn't natural to automatically grab it and put it on.

One candle can light a thousand candles and not be diminished.

We share Evie's grief at the loss of Peg. May she be comforted by our love and support, and may she know God's peace.
