Donate Diapers for Mary's Baby by Dec. 13

Luke's Gospel tells us that Mary "gave birth to her firstborn son, wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn." This nativity story tells of a young mother striving to care for her baby under tough conditions. It may also remind us of the challenges faced in 2020 by some young mothers in Susquehanna County.

To connect personally with the struggles of many young mothers today, parishioners of our three Upper Susquehanna County congregations are asked to donate a package of diapers and/or wipes by December 13th. (For shopping comparison purposes, a package of 31 new-born diapers appears to cost in the range of \$10-15.) Bring them to church by Sunday, December 13. The wardens will deliver our donations to different organizations that have agreed to distribute them to mothers in need. The Women's Resource Center and CareNet in Montrose especially need larger size diapers. Christ Church will deliver to the Trehab Food Bank in Susquehanna.

This Advent project will help us focus on preparing for baby Jesus in our lives.

An Advent of Anticipation

Advent is the season that begins the new church year. This year Advent begins on Sunday, November 29 and continues through Christmas Eve. Advent is an anticipatory season as we prepare for Christmas by readying our hearts for the newborn Jesus. During this time of expectancy, we not only remember the birth of Jesus, we call to mind the promise of the second coming.

Along with Christ Church, Susquehanna, and St. Mark's, New Milford, I invite us to consider several components that will help us focus on the season: our spiritual development, community involvement, pastoral care for shutins, and, finally, our Christmas Eve service.

Each parishioner will be offered a devotional booklet that will include the Collect for the week, a scripture reading for each day taken from the Daily Office in the BCP, a meditation which uses Lectio Divina (which will be explained in the booklet), and a time for silence and personal prayer. Anyone wishing a printed copy please call the office.

Because baby Jesus is the reason for the season, we will respond to a need in the community by donating baby clothes, diapers, formula, and baby food to Interfaith and the Women's Resource Center. These items will be collected during Advent and blessed in a liturgy on Sunday, December 13.

We will reach out to our shut-ins in a way that allows them to feel included and special. Please give some thought as to what this might be for our parish.

On Sunday, December 20, the three churches and anyone who cares to join us are invited to gather at 3:30 p.m. at St. Mark's for an outside caroling service. We will light candles and have a good old-fashioned sing-a-long with accompaniment.

Finally, we are delighted that Fr. Charles will officiate at our Christmas Eve services. Because of Covid restrictions and probable larger attendance at each church, we will hold services at Christ Church at 4 p.m.; St Mark's at 6 p.m.; and at St. Paul's at 8 p.m.

We hope that the season of Advent will be what each of us needs, not only to wait patiently for Christmas, but to use the four weeks to ponder the gift of the Christ child and how we can respond in love. Lynne

Fr. Bill's Morning Prayer

Morning again and we pray----Lord in you we trust, and have our being. We pledge ourselves to you this day. Night has gone and the week with it. Help us in our understanding of all things. Make us wise, for in the past our stupidity has dragged us down. Give us grace that marries our sincere faith to our best efforts.

We have been thinking Lord, about this path that we have walked with you. At times it has been a winding path through forest and woods. If asked, we would say that we are 'Seekers', seeking after the one true God, through his Son Jesus Christ. As Christians, we no longer believe that we are the only path to God. We acknowledge that Moslem or Hindu every Faith seeks truth and that their ultimate goal is God. Nor do we think that any one path is more meritorious than another. Even among other Christian denominations, we see that each has made its own way, with its own tradition. Some have cut a mighty road and we admire their effort and enterprise.

Yet our Episcopal way, is but a simple path. We like it that way. It is not paved, or walled, or even lined in any way with trees or signs. Rather it is an old Pilgrim Route, at times scarcely distinguishable from other paths. It has a kind of old fashioned ambience, a gentle Fellowship, a love of Scripture, a need for grace, a devotion to sacrament, a need to reason and a drive to serve the lost, poor, abandoned and the marginalized. Our hymns are old; our prayer follows an ancient rhythm; we live and worship in the moment, despite knowing that our worship and ministry is elliptical. We are content to 'be', exist, in a particular time and place, worshiping in the 'now' of our God. That may sound as if we are happy to wander in the 'woods' aimlessly! We tend to think that in our searching we have found a home; better still, that we have come home to God, and he dwells in our midst. ---To that extent we are maybe a 'Gypsy People', much as the people of Israel were a nomadic people in the Wilderness for all those years. We too are a Pilgrim people, content not to put our dreams into buildings, cities, castles or towers.

For this reason Lord, we can survive this 'time of plague' and this 'lockdown,' while our church buildings are closed. Our Book of Common Prayer goes with us. We rise to 'Morning Prayer', sleep to 'Evening Prayer' or Compline. Psalms, Collects, Creeds, Petitions are all here for us each day. Our journey and seeking does not stop as the church door closes. That is because the building is not our church. We are the church, the living breathing continuation of the ministry of Jesus in the world. We walk and talk the path he taught us. Is that not right Lord? ----O there are things we miss from when we were together, but we are like Paul Simon's "Old Friends"---separation does not detract from our love and friendship. Together, apart, we endure. We are Lakeside Daffodils, Winter, rain, cold or snow, we emerge once again come the Sun and the Spring. Frost and Ice do not kill us, because we are planted deep in the 'Word' and the 'Word' has come into the world and into our hearts, and that makes all the difference.

Come Lord Jesus, into our homes this day and in this season. Draw up a chair around the glow of this log fire of faith and be among us. The storm is raging outside; the wind is howling menace and pain, but we journey on, singing our song of 'How Great Thou Art'. Rest Lord, in the warmth of our campfire for we are your devoted 'Gypsy People'. Amen.
