The Cab Driver


As he arrived at the address he was given by the dispatcher, he honked the horn. After waiting a few minutes he blew the horn again. Thinking this was his last ride of the evening, if they didn't come soon he would just drive away. Instead he decided to go knock on the door. Just a minute answered a fragile elderly voice. The door opened and a small woman in her 90's stood before him dressed like someone out of a 1940's movie. By her side was a small suitcase. The apartment looked as if no one had lived in it for years. All the furniture was covered with sheets, there were no decorations on the walls and just cardboard boxes on the floor, one box filled with old pictures from years past. Would you carry my bag to the cab she asked. He took the bag to the cab and then went back to her. She

grabbed his arm and as they walked slowly to the cab, she kept thanking him for his kindness. It is nothing he said, I like to treat my passengers the same way I would want someone to treat me or my mother. You are such a good man she replied.

When they got in the cab she gave him an address and asked if they could drive through downtown on their way. He told her that it was out of the way and would cost her more. She responded I am in no hurry, I am on my way to hospice. He looked into the rear view mirror and saw tears in her eyes. I don't have any family left she said in a soft voice and I don't have long. Just then he reached over to the meter that was running and turned it off. What route would you like to take he asked, and so for the next several hours he took her thru town. She showed him the building where she had worked for many years as an elevator operator. They drove through the neighborhood where she and her husband had lived as newlyweds. They drove past an old furniture store that once was a ballroom where she had gone dancing as a young girl. Time passed and she told him that she was getting tired and she was ready to go.

They drove in silence to the address she had given him. As they drove up to the door, two gentleman came out and opened the door of the cab and welcomed her. The cab driver opened the trunk and took out the small suitcase and took it to the door. She asked him how much she owed him and he replied nothing and without thinking he gave her a big hug. She held him tightly and told him that he had given an old lady so much joy. As she walked in and the door closed behind her it sounded like the closing of a life. He drove away aimlessly, lost in thought. What if she had gotten an angry driver, or an inpatient one? What if he had driven away after the second honk of the horn? He felt he had done the most meaningful thing in his life.

We're conditioned to think that our lives revolve around great moments. But great moments often catch us unaware beautifully wrapped in what others may consider a small one. An Advent of Anticipation

Advent is the season that begins the new church year. This year Advent begins on Sunday, November 29 and continues through Christmas Eve. Advent is an anticipatory season as we prepare for Christmas by readying our hearts for the newborn Jesus. During this time of expectancy, we not only remember the birth of Jesus, we call to mind the promise of the second coming.

Along with Christ Church, Susquehanna, and St. Mark's, New Milford, I invite us to consider several components that will help us focus on the season: our spiritual development, community involvement, pastoral care for shutins, and, finally, our Christmas Eve service.

On the first Sunday of Advent, each parishioner will be offered a devotional booklet that will include the Collect for the week, a scripture reading for each day taken from the Daily Office in the BCP, a meditation which uses Lectio Divina (which will be explained in the booklet), and a time for silence and personal prayer. Because baby Jesus is the reason for the season, we will respond to a need in the community by donating baby clothes, diapers, formula, and baby food to Interfaith and the Women's Resource Center. These items will be collected during Advent and blessed in a liturgy on Sunday, December 13.

We will reach out to our shut-ins in a way that allows them to feel included and special. Please give some thought as to what this might be for our parish.

On Sunday, December 20, the three churches and anyone who cares to join us are invited to gather at 3:30 p.m. at St. Mark's for an outside caroling service. We will light candles and have a good old-fashioned sing-a-long with accompaniment.

Finally, we are delighted that Fr. Charles will officiate at our Christmas Eve services. Because of Covid restrictions and probable larger attendance at each church, we will hold services at Christ Church at 4 p.m.; St Mark's at 6 p.m.; and at St. Paul's at 8 p.m.

We hope that the season of Advent will be what each of us needs, not only to wait patiently for Christmas, but to use the four weeks to ponder the gift of the Christ child and how we can respond in love. Lynne

Just Like Clockwork -- Sunday, November 1st


