I would like to tell you all about an experience I had in elementary school that helped explain to me what God's Grace is like.

One day the teacher called out sick and we got a substitute. And with substitutes comes busy work. We had to do some weird type of word search where you look for the same word over and over and it could be spelled diagonal and backwards. The assignment was completed when all the words are linked together in a pattern.

Word searches are my kryptonite on a regular day. This one was just beyond me. I kept circling the wrong group of letters and then had to erase. But erasing only works so many times. If you try and erase too much you are left with this gray smudge of failure reminding you of all the times you wrote something wrong. It never looks like it did when you started. And if you keep on erasing you get this weird crinkle hole in the middle of your paper. So now you feel completely defeated because not only do you not know the answer but your paper is full of smudges and it is not a complete piece of paper anymore.

I broke down and cried and that was really unusual for me even as a kid. The substitute asked me what was wrong and I showed her my paper.

Before I tell you what her reaction was let me start with what she didn't say.

She didn't react negatively and say "Stop your crying and get back to work"

She didn't react apathetically and say "Just keep trying until you get it"

She didn't even react educationally and say "Let me show you how you could do better"

What she did was amazing. She told me it was no big deal, smoothed my paper out and did the assignment for me. In perfect teacher pen she quickly made the pattern and gave the paper back to me. She then told the class that Eric had the right answers on his paper and if they were stuck and needed a hint that they could come see me. It was just so completely above and beyond anything I could have ever dared expect. I was unable to do my assignment, ruined my paper, broke down, handed my paper to my teacher who did the work for me and then used me as a teaching tool for the rest of the class.

And that is what I think of when I think of Grace. When we have completely messed everything up and are unable to help ourselves, God comes down and helps us out. God gives us help when we are completely unable to help ourselves.

Third Sunday of Advent, December 13, 2020

THE GOSPEL - There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. This is the testimony given by John when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, "Who are you?" He confessed and did not deny it, but confessed, "I am not the Messiah." And they asked him, "What then? Are you Elijah?" He said, "I am not." "Are you the prophet?" He answered, "No." Then they said to him, "Who are you? Let us have an answer for those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?" He said, "I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way of the Lord," as the prophet Isaiah said. Now they had been sent from the Pharisees. They asked him, "Why then are you baptizing if you are neither the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the prophet?" John answered them, "I baptize with water. Among you stands one whom you do not know, the one who is coming after me; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandal." This took place in Bethany across the Jordan where John was baptizing. *(John 1:6-8,19-28)*

Fr. Bill's Morning Prayer

It is the Third Sunday of Advent. We light the Pink Candle and remember that this is 'Gaudete' Sunday.' ---Advent is full of nostalgia, old memories and symbols of bygone years. We wait, we pray, on this cold December morning, as Advent invites us to begin this liturgical journey of faith that begins with the 'Anawim.' Those few faithful souls who clung to the promises of the prophets, and the holy ones of old that one day, God would again lead his people out of the wilderness of their disbelief to a new kind of kingdom.

The message of the prophets in today's readings is no less relevant today for our world. Sad to say, it does not come in the form of a text message, or an e-mail on a thousand dollar IPhone. No, with quill and scroll, Isaiah wrote; "the spirit of the lord is upon me, he has anointed me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind the broken-hearted, bring liberty to captives, comfort the mourning and to proclaim a year of favor...."

They are fighting revolutionary words that should and could stir the mind, heart and soul of any listener particularly the young. They are Advent words, a clarion call to action, change and challenge. How often we have heard them chosen for an ordination down the years. How easily they have been forgotten by the many. Every generation of young Christian should read those words from Isaiah 61: 1--4. They tug at the idealism of youth. They speak of a better world, unheard by any Bluetooth.

In today's Gospel, John the Baptist walks out of the Desert to preach and baptize by the River Jordan. He speaks a singular truth, undeterred by authority, Pharisees and Scribes. Down the centuries he has become the archetype, for that lone voice of conscience in every generation, who sees wrong and evil and speaks out. "Where is that voice today?" We ask. When truth is called a 'lie' and the 'lie' becomes the truth.

Advent is the Season of the 'Few', the Anawim, who wait, pray, look to, another day and call all of us to account. Where do our hearts lie? What are our values today? Who and what is the God in our life that grabs our attention? Are we people of the world or people of the spirit?--For the Christ we should believe in, was not interested in the Dow Jones Index, the state of the Stock Market. He was not born to build a financial empire. Nor was he born in a palace with white skin. No, Jesus was a Jewish-Arab born into poverty in a humble stable because '…there was no room at the Inn.'

So what are we Anawim to do in this Season of Advent? Like John the Baptist we are called to 'cry out', make straight the way of the Lord! That has more to do with being men and women of 'truth' rather than rebuilding the highway. The truth is hard work. The truth is at times painful. The truth is open to ridicule, abuse and sometimes subject to violence. That is nothing new. It happened to John. It happened to Jesus, why would we expect anything different?

We pray Lord, on this Third Sunday as we wait on your coming into our hearts, minds and spirit, that you bring us this one gift. 'Truth', that we hold fast to the truth your prophets wrote

and you proclaimed and taught with the example of our lives. Then and only then will we be Anawim. Amen.
