"VIEW FROM THE PEW"

We got about ten inches of snow last night. A blanket of white to start the New Year fresh and clean. I find myself drawn to the window just to stare at the beauty of it. I'm afraid I did a lot of that in 2020, figuratively speaking—just staring. I'm usually a person of pretty high energy, but 2020 was a challenge. Sure, we took frequent hikes at Salt Springs with Sophie, our three-year-old Springer Spaniel, and I managed to cook dinner *every night* (which I haven't had to do since we had three little ones at home.) But I often found myself filling up the hours with insignificant busywork. I had no desire to start any projects or finish any that I'd started earlier. Boxes of photos that I wanted to divide for our boys remain boxes of photos. Other than making masks, I hardly used my sewing machine.

So I needed a fresh start as I imagine many of us do. It occurred to me while reading Morning Prayer on Sunday, that Jesus offers us just what we need. The divine became human to show us how to live into our calling. Jesus came to earth to show us, as a human, so we could relate to his humanity. I'm reminded of a particular Christmas card that made this point. The All Saints Sisters of the Poor in Catonsville, MD near our home in Ellicott City had, at their convent, a scriptorium that was open to the public. I would quietly creep in the front door of the convent and down the dimly lit hall so as not to disturb whatever the nuns were doing. In a large, library type room, they displayed for sale the hundreds of note cards, enclosure cards, sayings, and Christmas cards that had been beautifully hand scripted and illustrated. They were not your typical cards. I remember one card about a nun finding birds stuck in a barn and trying to get out by flying into closed windows and nothing she tried would shoe them out the open door. She was frantic to help them and thought to herself, "if only I could become a bird and show them the way as Jesus became human for us." Unusual card, right? But spot-on sentiment.

Jesus' nativity is my reminder that we are to follow his way regardless of circumstances or

viruses. Many inspirational people have overcome obstacles far greater than my inconvenience of having to postpone my normal life style until the Coronavirus is under control. In fact, these trying times offer wonderful opportunities to respond to the needs of others. I'm not very good about sticking to New Year's resolutions, but I can start over fresh and clean. I will try in 2021 to relate to Jesus' teachings in a way that gives me energy and hope and allows me to lighten the burden of someone else. How awesome is it that God became human to show us how?
