"VIEW FROM THE PEW"

Being outside and active on a sunny yet cold winter's day can be an exhilarating experience. You let the blood circulate and your heart pump endorphins throughout your body causing feelings of well being (this is quite oversimplified, but the end result is still there). This is a great time to enjoy time with family - kids and adults together - and friends.

A friend of mine and I created an ice skating rink on a small snow covered pond nearby for his two young daughters. I think we may have enjoyed it more than they did. We drilled a hole in the ice, and instead of putting fishing line and a hook through the hole, we used a generator and water pump to siphon the pond water out of the hole to make fresh smooth ice, after clearing the snow away. The ice was about four inches thick, but when I jumped up and down, the water in the hole started vibrating quite a bit. Maybe the ice wasn't as strong as I thought. I walked a little lighter after that. The fish are safe for now at the bottom deeper layers of the pond where the water is warmer, wiling away their time until the warmer spring temperatures melt the ice, and the water temperatures begin the climb of the mercury on the thermometer.



Even though winter is a time for rest and resetting, in the form of hibernation for some animals, and dormancy with plant life, it is an easy time of the year to become Inside bodies watching television of which I'm guilty, and playing video games, which also can be a little fun and addictive. Take the time to keep yourself active and alive at times. It is good for the soul and physically beneficial to you. For plant life, it is the time for the seed stratification process which occurs over winter and when winter breaks to spring, if signifies to the seeds to break dormancy and begin the process of germination, starting life all over again. Winter can be a long and arduous time of year, especially the further north you get, but also is full of good memories: making snow angels; drinking hot chocolate made with whole milk that forms a skin on top with marshmallows melting in it; waist deep in snow; sledding down through fields or down snow covered dirt roads; making snow forts and tunnels; and not so fun freezing cold feet that almost feel burning when coming in from these enjoyable acts.

We approved the minutes of the November 12, 2020 meeting. There was no Vestry meeting in December.

Lynne read the Bible study scripture 1Corinthians 1:10-25 in which Paul admonished the Corinthians to focus on Jesus and not be concerned with who in particular baptized them. He noted that, although he had baptized a few, he had been sent to preach the Gospel. He appealed to them to be in agreement and not have divisions, so that they might be united in mind and thought. Fr. Bill's Morning Prayer – Here I Am Lord

Four Generations of Warriners



John Warriner is standing between his great-grandfather, the Rev. Edward Augustus Warriner (1829-1908) on the right, and his grandfather, Samuel Dexter Warriner (1867-1942) on the left. Rev. Warriner was St. Paul's 11th rector from 1867 to 1906 and lived in the house that is Regan's Funeral Home today on South Main Street. John's grandfather donated the funds for the Parish House that was built in 1927 in memory of his father and owned Fernheim Farm on Rt. 29 north of town. It's not hard to tell John is a Warriner.

Early Postcards of St. Paul's

These two early post cards were obtained from Ebay last week. The one on the left is a photograph of St. Paul's taken sometime between 1900, when the electric wires were run in front of the church; and 1906, when the postcard was postmarked. The postcard on the right was postmarked 1908. It is the same photograph but made into a colored card by a firm in Germany. It's quite handsome. The tree branches in the top right of the picture on the left were removed when they colored it. Both were mailed from Montrose -- the one was sent to Clarks Summit and the other to Norwich, New York. They were sold at several stores in town.
