1st Sunday After Christmas

The Gospel

In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. All went to their own towns to be registered. Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for see--I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger." And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors!"

[When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us." So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them. But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them. (Luke 2:1-14)

Mary Ann Dewitt played the organ and Kevin Bryant of the Tri-Cities Opera, tenor soloist, sang *O Holy Nigh*t, *O Come O Come Emmanuel*, and *Silent Night*. We initiated a process where you could call in on a telephone and listen to the service. The live-streamed service was well watched and is available on YouTube. It has been viewed by over 90 people at last count.





December 27th Service, 1st Sunday After Christmas

The December 27th live-streamed Morning Prayer service was led by Tom Undercoffler. It was the first Sunday after Christmas. The Advent candles, replaced with white for Christmas, were lit. The Gospel

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.

He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. (John testified to him and cried out,

"This was he of whom I said, 'He who comes after me ranks ahead of me because he was before me.'") From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known. (*John 1:1-18*)

Picture from Christmas at St. Paul's, 1936



This picture was photographed in 1936 -- eighty-four years ago. The church was about 80 years old and the parish hall next door was just seven years old. It was taken at Christmas. There were some differences then. The choir was still on the altar stage and the altar itself was set against the back wall so that the Priest's back was to the congregation. You can see the big grate in the middle of the aisle which let the coal-fired heat up. There was an electric light at the peak of the arch which is no longer there. Garlands were tied to it and hung from the sides. Live evergreens were placed at the front of the church. What's neat is, Joe Welden was age 11 then and probably attended Christmas service that week.
