After John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news." 1858 Map of Montrose Showing St. Paul's



Old maps can be fun. The above section is of Montrose, containing town lots 56-58 facing Church Street between Cherry and Chestnut. It is from a map that was printed in 1858, about one year after St. Paul's was built. It has Cherry and Chestnut Streets switched but is interesting to look at. Lot 56, contained four buildings. The Odd Fellows Hall, top left, which was razed in 1927 and replaced by our parish hall; our brand new church is next, the J.W. Chapman house under the Odd Fellows Hall, now William Owens & Co., is next door, and our old original church building on the corner, which was then empty, is now the lawyer's office. Heading east on Church St., Lot 57 has one house on it listed as the Lathrop Office. This large structure was torn down after 1882 and the lot split, with two houses added. The house added on the left, would be known as the Knoll house. It was obtained by the church in 1965 and razed. It became our Memorial Garden. The second house which was added to the east, still exists. Finally lot 58, has two structures. The house listed as the R.B. Little house was originally the Joshua Raynesford house, St. Paul's original senior warden. It burned down sometime between 2012 and 2014. The house on the corner of Cherry St. and Cedar Lane and marked EP. Pars(onage) still exists unchanged. Isaac Post's Tavern was immediately across Church Street where the bank is now.
