

God leads and we follow. Yet, we are still human, and we still get in knots from time to time. I'm learning when this happens, I need to just sit quietly and listen...God will lead.



We approved the minutes of the January 14, 2021 meeting.

Lynne read the Bible study scripture Psalm 147 which happened to be the Psalm from last Sunday also. We talked about how God binds up wounds and heals. We discussed vs.12 "the Lord has pleasure in those who fear him" and how the meaning changes if fear means respect or revere.

The Parochial Report is due in March. This year the report is asking about challenges and opportunities during the Covid pandemic year and also for the future.

The Rev. Melinda Artman is aware of our interest in finding clergy. Hopefully, she can facilitate a meeting among the three parishes to openly discuss our plans for the future. Melinda is available to officiate services for Easter Vigil and Easter Day.

Lenten Program. Ash Wednesday is February 17. We will livestream the service from St. Paul's at 7:00 with the Sr. Wardens from Christ Church, St. Mark's, and St. Paul's. discuss the presentation among ourselves on Thursday evenings. Our three parishes will provide an Easter treat to Susquehanna Co. recipients of Meals on Wheels and their drivers. We received a \$500.00 grant to be matched by donations from our three parishes.

We reviewed and approved the Budget for 2021 which includes a pay raise for Betty. The budget will be presented at the Annual Meeting. We accepted the Treasurer's report with thanks to John for his stellar job of keeping us all informed.

We need leaders for Morning Prayer and volunteers to write articles for the *View from the Pew* in the weekly updates.

Lynne closed the meeting with a prayer from Guerillas of Grace by Ted Loder.

LAST SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY

The Gospel

Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and led them up a high mountain apart, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. And there appeared to them Elijah with Moses, who were talking with Jesus. Then Peter said to Jesus, "Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." He did not know what to say, for they were terrified. Then a cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud there came a voice, "This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!" Suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them anymore, but only Jesus.

As they were coming down the mountain, he ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead. (Mark 9:2-9)

Fr. Bill's Morning Prayer

In this early morning we rise to pray and begin this day. The depths of Winter are upon us; the snow piled high with no birds in sight. We are Lord, still in Epiphany; late in Epiphany; in a time of waiting. We desperately need lifting, like mourners after a funeral; living in this 'Limbo', where there is no hope of Spring. It is worse than a 'Holy Saturday' moment, a time entombed, waiting for a 'Resurrection Morning'.

Truth be told we probably need Lent this year Lord, more than any other year. February 17, cannot come too soon. Last year was such an interrupted Lent, thrown as we were into Covid, isolation, self-distancing and lockdown. We were too panicked to count the cost. It was as if we were at once at war. ---This year, we wear that blank stare of weariness, and the pale faces of drifting survivors, numb to everything but the hideous numbers of loss that has stolen a place in

our heads. ---Now Lord, we would welcome travel; that long walk into the Desert of Lent. Six weeks of cleansing, emptying, casting out the toxic mix of resentment, bitter truths, lies and guilt that our memories accumulated during our 'cabin fever'. ---We need refreshing Lord, if only to be washed by the windswept sands of Sahara.

No, the Desert will do, for the desert has no memories of its own. It has no voices, but our own and your voice calling. How often did we read that you went off to a lonely place to pray? How long did you truly spend alone in the Desert before your ministry really began? What were you seeking in the hills and barren caves? What were you praying now that you had left the Kingdom of your Father and chose to dwell here in this Godless Globe at the very edge of the many Universes? ---Were you showing us a self-emptying, that leaves us stripped of all but pure spirit? Were you preparing us for a 'new way' scrubbed clean by the sands of that wilderness?

Bring it on Lord, this Lent of yours, for this year we are ready. "Dust thou art, and on to dust you shall return." We have seen it. Our friends' ashes stand on the shelf awaiting burial in the Spring! I told you Lord that we are numb. We need Lent to blow the air, wind, breeze, Oxygen through our heads and bodies. We need to be resurrected. We go into the Desert to seek you. We need to renew the 'seeds of faith' for ours have been buried. Not by the cruel snows of winter, but by the death cries of our friends dying alone, with only the tubes muffling the agony of their bleeding lungs. We need the 'seeds of knowing' that you sent your Angels to be with them, at their end. We need faith knowing, that the slamming of the great stone upon their tomb, was not the final, last and only sound they heard!

Bring us then to Lent Lord, for we are ready. Like John the Baptist we are girded, sandals on feet and staff in hand. Guide us in the way of prayer. Starve us with bread, water and your Word that we may see a hopeful Easter somewhere on the horizon of our day. Amen.
