Ashes will be available for self-imposition at home by calling the office at 570-278-2954. You may either pick them up during office hours or ask, by February 11, for them to be mailed to you.



#### **Staying Connected with Others--More Ideas**

For your consideration, here are some other options for you individually to stay connected with others during Lent. Stay alert and you'll see some of your fellow parishioners doing these.

# Shrove Tuesday- Deliver a Gift of Food, Make a Phone Call

We can't gather together for pancakes this year but we can pick up a church phone directory and give a phone call to a parishioner, especially those who don't get out much. Consider safely delivering a gift of food—dessert or "pancake muffins"-- in line with Mardi Gras (Fat Tuesday). Use your imagination.

St David's Day (March 1) – Remember the good deeds of the patron saint of Wales (founder of 12 monasteries) with traditional daffodils. Deliver a bunch to a fellow parishioner or anybody to whom they would bring joy.

Mothering Sunday (March 14) – Mothering Sunday is the fourth Sunday of Lent. Traditionally, it was a day when children, mainly daughters, who had gone to work as domestic servants were given a day off to visit

their **mother** and family. Because this no longer applies to us, why not send a "thinking of you" card to a resident at Meadow View (or any local nursing home) who has no child to visit. You don't have to know them; the activities director will see the card gets to the right person.

#### THE GOSPEL


### January 31th Service - Brrrr
