"VIEW FROM THE PEW"

What a roller coaster ride it must have been. Jesus was teaching, preaching, and healing. Things were going along swimmingly, and when he turned his face to Jerusalem, the disciples must have figured that this would be the culmination of his ministry. Finally, at last, the Messiah had come to claim what had been prophesied to the people throughout the

Scriptures. A king who would save them from the oppressive rule of the Romans.

Jesus rode into Jerusalem hailed as the Messiah. Branches and garments were laid in front of him. Hosanna!! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the King of Israel! But the accolades were short lived. As Jesus sat with his disciple at the Passover meal, he washed their feet and instructed them to do the same to one another. He predicted his betrayal and Peter's denial. Were the disciples thinking, "Hold on a minute. How does this fit into a King's reign?"

At the end of a long day, sleep overtakes them in the Garden of Gethsemane despite Jesus waking them three times to ask them to pray. With no clue about what is about to happen, they follow Jesus to his betrayal and arrest. Things are out of control. Peter hangs back for fear of incrimination and denies Jesus three times.

I can only imagine the confusion as the disciples huddled together in some back room trying to make sense of it all. On Good Friday they watched from a distance as Jesus was crucified. We have the advantage of knowing "the rest of the story", but the disciples must have been devastated. On the third day, Mary Magdalene found Jesus' tomb empty.

Assuming someone had stolen the body, Mary did not recognize Jesus when he appeared to her until he called her by name.

The Easter story would not be the same without the roller coaster ride of Holy Week. Please join us for services on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday at 7:00 p.m., so we are prepared to celebrate the Resurrection.

Hosanna in the Highest Heaven

When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, "Why are you doing this?' just say this, "The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately.' "

They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting, "Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David! Hosanna in the highest heaven!" Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve. (Mark 11:1-11)

Pay Attention - Keith Miller, Life Path

Have you gazed out the window this past week? If you were looking around, you would have seen a slight greenish hue beginning to cover brown bushes in the woods. And the ground is opening up, ever so slightly, for the daffodils to look around and alert us to the impending burst of color.

This is the time to pay attention to the natural world. Life is emerging, and if we are looking for it, we will be surprised by beauty over and over again. It's almost resurrection season, when seemingly dead things come to life, reminding us that there is always more going on than what we see or assume. But you have to look around and pay attention.

"Paying attention" to Jesus is, unsurprisingly, central to a vibrant faith. But sometimes we view this attention as simply the means to an end. Author Mark Buchanan recounts a story during his pastoral years when a man in his congregation came to him for counsel. "I know that God is trying to get my attention right now. I just haven't figured out what he wants my attention for. He must want me to do something." Mark thought a moment. Then he replied, "Well, maybe God.... just wants your attention." Maybe this is the deepest form of transformation: the giving of our attention. We become more like Jesus by noticing, all the time, God's sacred presence.

Attention like this is what God invites us into. It's restful and indulgent. Quietly sitting on the couch together. Not always accomplishing. Not always discussing. Just delighting in the peace of presence, and noticing that God is with us and among us. That sort of "being" is the foundation for a life of real depth and purpose (the "doing"). But don't move through it too quickly.

Already, as the Covid season begins to recede, many of our lives are picking up pace. In the coming months school commitments, church life, work, and social events will likely provide many opportunities for a fuller schedule. But remember: Busyness can make us stop caring about the things we care about. This is true of a busy schedule, a busy mind, or a busy heart.

Jesus is the "rich lens of attention" by which we walk through our lives with a heart of rest, grace, and meaning. This is basic discipleship. When we are looking around the world through the lens of Jesus, our busyness will never be more important than God's presence. It will never be more important than hospitality. It will never be more important than interruptions. We will notice those in need around us and in our world, and respond.... because in those moments we're noticing the very face of Jesus himself. Eyes fixed on Jesus will always move us toward eyes of compassion for others.

This week seems to be as appropriate a week as any to start by living expectantly. So look around for Jesus. Rest in those moments of beauty without too quickly needing to do something with it all. Pay attention to the pain around you as well, so that you might not miss Jesus in the face of our sisters and brothers who suffer. Take time to love and be loved. Jesus is nearby. Pay attention today.

Jesus, both positive and negative things can distract me from your heart. Increase my awareness of you, over and over again, today. Amen
