

"VIEW FROM THE PEW"

After a 6,000 some mile 12 hour plane ride in two legs, my wife and I arrived into Fairbanks, Alaska. It was a long time to be wearing a mask, but I can definitely sense the light at the end of this pandemic tunnel. Other than the mask being required during air travel, there is definitely a greater sense of freedom and security in the general public. There also

doesn't seem to be the prevalent panic that there was a year ago and lack of empathy toward others which displayed an unfortunate greedy and hoarding mentality.

Alaska has the feeling of being in a world of its own - the final frontier, unless you are going into outer space or Siberia. The black bears found in Pennsylvania are not quite like the grizzlies (or brown bears) found in the Alaskan wilderness. During a couple months around the summer solstice, it is known as the land of the midnight sun. I guess in mid winter you could call it the land of the noon moon. In the pictures below, you see on the left at midnight as seen from the air between Seattle, WA and Fairbanks, AK (maybe around British Columbia). On the right, was at 12:39 AM just before landing in Fairbanks.



Summertime here is a breath of fresh air after an extremely long and cold winter and surprisingly short spring. It went from three feet of snow and melt out to the green buds of spring, then summer in a relatively short period of time. The Wood Frogs that were dormant and actually two thirds frozen through the winter started coming out then. With the

exception of the truck in the driveway and the occasional military aircraft flying out of the nearby base, you are really in a pristine and wild natural environment that could take you back a hundred years. No phones necessary and no houses in evidence and no bridges beyond this mostly uninhabited region - just a boat or plane ride west to the Commonwealth of Independent States (Russia).

The Gospel – With what can we compare the kingdom of God

Jesus said, "The kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground, and would sleep and rise night and day, and the seed would sprout and grow, he does not know how. The earth produces of itself, first the stalk, then the head, then the full grain in the head. But when the grain is ripe, at once he goes in with his sickle, because the harvest has come."

He also said, "With what can we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable will we use for it? It is like a mustard seed, which, when sown upon the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes the greatest of all shrubs, and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade."

With many such parables he spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it; he did not speak to them except in parables, but he explained everything in private to his disciples. (Mark 4:26-34)

Father Bill's Morning Prayer;

In this early morning Lord we pray. Someone told me, not so long ago that I could not get to heaven without being Catholic. "Which Catholic?" I asked. Catholics in New York are as different from Catholics in Europe, as chalk and cheese! "Why are you Episcopalian?" They asked.

That is so easy to answer I replied. I am Episcopalian because it is the one denomination that allows me to think for myself, hold my own opinions, make my own moral decisions and follow Jesus and the Gospel as a free thinking liberated person!---If you love freedom, if you have an intellect, if you care about others, if you feel you have an obligation to serve the poor, the marginalized, the handicapped, the sick, the prisoner, the rejected and those who are simply different------then the Episcopal church is a good place to be. Except that we don't really recruit, advertise, or judge other denominations, we let people listen to their heart and go Lord, where you would lead them.

I do not believe my God is Episcopalian, nor Catholic, nor white, nor male, or female. My God is the one who gives us freedom and a free-will, even if that means that he is rejected by many.

You do not have to believe in God, nor follow his ways, nor keep his commandments. God does not force anyone to love him, worship him, or adhere to his Son's teachings and especially does he not brand each one of us with a number and a name that reads "Episcopalian"; "Catholic", "Lutheran" or "Baptist!" Our God 'let's us be', to find our own way to him, the ultimate source of light and love. Many never find that path, which is a pity, like a utility that desperately needs to be re-charged.

We who believe, or have received the gift of Faith, do not so much 'know God', but rather we have experienced him in our lives. I would say that we feel God. Sometimes we use language such as hearing God's call, an urge to go a particular way. For some that is a life-time commitment. For others, God seems to change the path that we are on, like a GPS taking us by a different route. Jesus talks about the 'wind', we hear it, we feel it, but we are never quite sure which way it blows. Our experience of God can be like that, we see and feel him in our own responses to his intervention in our lives.

I listen to Jazz and hear the horn section suggest a melody. The clarinet is going to reply, but not always quite in the way the horns expect. It is not as if the clarinet wants to be rebellious, awkward, or darn-right stubborn, he just feels that he has the freedom to play his notes differently. He can switch them around, even change key. He knows that somewhere up ahead he will get back to what the horns are saying. The horns don't really resent this. They have an appreciation for the clarinet's versatility, , capability and freedom of expression. In fact they may well try and tease him by stealing some of his creativity and harmonizing with it.

My God lets me play the melodies of life my way. He doesn't and did not create robots. He knows when I choose to mess with the notes and he loves me for it. No. I don't think that Jazz band in heaven will be 'all Catholic', I definitely feel that it will have a lot of diversity. I cannot wait to hear that sound.

If you Lord, are the Pied Piper, I know that you will understand. Yes, I will follow you, but you know I am going to play the tune my way! Amen. Fr. Bill


Donate Button Added to Web-page
