"VIEW FROM THE PEW" THE EMPTY CHAIR

Mandy Marie asked her pastor, James to come and pray with her father as he was ill. When the pastor arrived, he found her father in bed with his head propped up on two pillows. There was an empty chair sitting beside his bed. The pastor assumed that the father had been informed of his visit. " I guess you were expecting me" he said. "No. I was not expecting you." Who are you?" I'm the new pastor at your church," he replied. "when I saw the empty chair, I figured you knew I was coming. "Oh yeah, the chair," said the bedridden man. "Would you mind closing the door?" Puzzled, the pastor shut the door. " I have never told anyone this, not even my daughter," said the man. But all of my life I have never known how to pray. At church I used to hear the pastor talk about prayer, but it went right over my head. I abandoned any attempt at prayer, the man continued, until one day about four years ago my best friend said to

me, Bob, prayer is just a simple matter of having a conversation with Jesus. Here is what I suggest. Sit down in a chair, with another chair in front of you., and in faith see Jesus sitting on the chair. It's not spooky because he promised, I'll be with you always. Then just speak to him and listen in the same way you're doing with me right now. So I tried it and I've liked it so much that I do it a couple of hours each day. The pastor was deeply moved by the story and encouraged the man to continue on the journey. Then he prayed with him, anointed him with oil, and returned to the church. Two nights later the daughter called and told the pastor that her father had passed away. "Did he die in peace? He asked. Yes, when I left the house, he called me over to his bedside and kissed me on the cheek and told me he loved me. When I got back from the store an hour later he had passed away. But there was something strange about his passing. Apparently, just before daddy died, he leaned over and rested his head on the chair beside his bed. What do you make of that? THE GOSPEL - Daughter, your faith has made you well

When Jesus had crossed again in the boat to the other side, a great crowd gathered around him; and he was by the sea. Then one of the leaders of the synagogue named Jairus came and, when he saw him, fell at his feet and begged him repeatedly, "My little daughter is at the point of death. Come and lay your hands on her, so that she may be made well, and live." So he went with him.

And a large crowd followed him and pressed in on him. Now there was a woman who had been suffering from hemorrhages for twelve years. She had endured much under many physicians, and had spent all that she had; and she was no better, but rather grew worse. She

had heard about Jesus, and came up behind him in the crowd and touched his cloak, for she said, "If I but touch his clothes, I will be made well." Immediately her hemorrhage stopped; and she felt in her body that she was healed of her disease. Immediately aware that power had gone forth from him, Jesus turned about in the crowd and said, "Who touched my clothes?" And his disciples said to him, "You see the crowd pressing in on you; how can you say, 'Who touched me?'" He looked all around to see who had done it. But the woman, knowing what had happened to her, came in fear and trembling, fell down before him, and told him the whole truth. He said to her, "Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace, and be healed of your disease."

While he was still speaking, some people came from the leader's house to say, "Your daughter is dead. Why trouble the teacher any further?" But overhearing what they said, Jesus said to the leader of the synagogue, "Do not fear, only believe." He allowed no one to follow him except Peter, James, and John, the brother of James. When they came to the house of the leader of the synagogue, he saw a commotion, people weeping and wailing loudly. When he had entered, he said to them, "Why do you make a commotion and weep? The child is not dead but sleeping." And they laughed at him. Then he put them all outside, and took the child's father and mother and those who were with him, and went in where the child was. He took her by the hand and said to her, "Talitha cum," which means, "Little girl, get up!" And immediately the girl got up and began to walk about (she was twelve years of age). At this they were overcome with amazement. He strictly ordered them that no one should know this, and told them to give her something to eat. (*Mark 5:21-43*)

"I dream I hear a Piper play, maybe it's a notion I dream I see white horses dance, upon that other ocean. It's a long long way from Clare to here, It's a long long way, it gets further day by day It's a long long way from Clare to here." Lord as we pray, we ask you for 'Peace of the heart.' Not a bad thing to ask for in these days. A heart at peace seems rested. We need that. Sometimes we only truly find it when we are truly alone. There is a lot to be said for spending time alone. Alone our thoughts unwind, along that winding rosary of life.

Give us that Peace we seek Lord, in these Autumnal Orange tinted years. Our heads cannot take too much noise, brattle, that wake the battle scars of long lost years. Give us Peace, 'Dropping from the veils of the morning, to where the cricket sings....'

In Peace we pray, and praying we find: 'a far far better rest that I go to, than I have ever known.' Amen.
