View from the Pew

Just up the road from my home is a field with two horses in it. From a distance each looks like every other horse. But if you stop your car or are walking by, you will notice something quite amazing. Looking into the eyes of one horse will disclose that he is blind. His owner has chosen not to have him put down, bug has made a good home for him. This alone is amazing.

If nearby and listening, you will hear the sound of a bell. Looking around for the source

of the sound, you will see that it comes from the smaller horse in the field. Attached to her halter is a small bell. It lets her blind friend know where she is, so he can follow her. As you stand and watch these two friends, you'll see how she's always checking on him, and that he will listen for her bell and then slowly walk to where she is, trusting that she will not lead him astray.

When she returns to the shelter of the barn each evening, she stops occasionally and looks back, making sure her friend isn't too far behind to hear the bell. Like the owner of these two horses, God does not throw us away just because we are not perfect or because we have problems or challenges. God watches over us and even brings others into our lives to help us when we are in need.

Sometimes we are the blind horse being guided by the little ringing bell of those whom God places in our lives. Other times we are the guide horse, helping others see the way. Good friends are like this. You don't always see them, but you know they are always there. Please listen for my bell and I'll listen for yours.

THE GOSPEL

Some Pharisees came, and to test Jesus they asked, "Is it lawful for a man to divorce his wife?" He answered them, "What did Moses command you?" They said, "Moses allowed a man to write a certificate of dismissal and to divorce her." But Jesus said to them, "Because of your hardness of heart he wrote this commandment for you. But from the beginning of creation, 'God made them male and female.' 'For this reason a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh.' So they are no longer two, but one flesh. Therefore what God has joined together, let no one separate."

Then in the house the disciples asked him again about this matter. He said to them, "Whoever divorces his wife and marries another commits adultery against her; and if she divorces her husband and marries another, she commits adultery."

People were bringing little children to him in order that he might touch them; and the disciples spoke sternly to them. But when Jesus saw this, he was indignant and said to them, "Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God as a little child will never enter it." And he took them up in his arms, laid his hands on them, and blessed them. *(Mark 10:2-16)*

We are in October, a month of golden colors, colder weather and great change. We thank you Lord for the beauty of the season, the changing hues that greet us each and every day and we pray.

The nearer we get to the year's end the more we tend to reflect on what has gone before. We need to stop doing that Lord and live forever in the present. Our past is done, the door has closed, the years and seasons have come and gone. We cannot go back, re-live nor re-do. It is a closed book.

For Lord, we belong to your 'living-Gospel', called as we are to follow you by becoming your word that others may follow too. Looking back gives us no joy, for all we see are our failures, faults, broken promises, twisted ways. We can have joy today; joy in a kind of knowing; a joy just beyond happiness; because we live, work, think act in the Spirit.

We know that we are deep in the second half of this game of life. Even if the first half did not go well, now we are three goals up with minutes to play. Our success does not rely on others. We thank you that you chose us for your team, gave us a purpose and supported us in bad times as well as good.

Lord, we have changed. Changed from the 'me' years of our lives to something other. We thank you that small, unimportant, insignificant as we are, you have lifted us up by calling us friend. In your friendship we have become and becoming we have participated in something greater than ourselves. Your kingdom has come to us, like the healing hand that sooths away our anxiety and cares. Amen.

Deacon Liz's Weekly

This week we are celebrating a baptism, well actually, three baptisms, and we are taking a break from the Year B lectionary in order to read scripture related to baptism. Therefore, I have decided to write about the Gospel we are skipping.

A man kneels before Jesus and asks what he must do to inherit eternal life. Jesus quotes the commandments to him and the man says he has kept them since his youth. Then Jesus lovingly says, "You lack one thing, sell all that you have and give the money to the poor and you will have treasure in Heaven; then, come, and follow me." The man leaves bereft at the instruction because he has many possessions. Jesus tells the disciples that it would be easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter Heaven. The disciples say, "who then can be saved?" Jesus tells them that for mortals it is impossible, but with God all things are possible. He further tells them that whoever has given up everything and everyone in this life will in turn receive a hundredfold, and in the age to come, eternal life.

First, we have Jesus' disposition when telling the man that he must sell all and follow Him. Jesus expresses love toward the man. Why? Because Jesus knows that He is asking something that will be too much for the man to carry out. And indeed, it is. The man hangs his head, dejected because he has many possessions. The man is attached to his wealth and cannot bear the idea of parting with it.

Where would we be if the teacher asked us to give everything up and follow Him? Would we have the courage to give it all up and go with Him?

Jesus did not make this request of everyone that He came in contact with. Something about the man drove Jesus ask him to go with Him. Yet He knew that the man would not and so, He loved him. He understood that the man's attachment to his wealth and possessions was too strong and that there was no way he could follow Jesus' instructions. He felt compassion for the man.

Second, Jesus says that for mortals it's impossible to give everything up, but with God all things are possible. In response to the disciple's question about who can be saved, Jesus says no one, except for those who rely on God. Our attachments are so overpowering that only through divine guidance are we able to release them. Consider how difficult it is for an addict to get clean, someone to go on a diet, or keep a budget. Now, imagine giving up the thing to which you are most attached - without help it is impossible.

God makes the impossible, possible. It is by following God, turning one's will over to the care of God that we can overcome attachments which enslave us. When we rely on God, He will guide us to do His will and we will have relief from that which we thought we needed in order to survive.

Remember, God loves you no matter what, and through God all things are possible, even the impossible.


St. Paul's on Channel 16
