## **Deacon Liz's Weekly**

This week I would like to thank all of those who have donated coats to Coats for Our Community. This is an initiative of the church that helps approximately 1600 people each year who are in need of warm coats throughout Susquehanna County.

This initiative in addition to the others our parishioners are involved in; the Stop the Stigma events, the soup dinner, the making of sleeping bags, and the food pantry are blessings for the community. These are ways of living out our Baptismal covenant. They are forms of stewardship.

Stewardship is the giving of time, talent and treasure for the building up of the Kingdom of God. We are called to participate in these three ways. Some of us are able to give more in one way than another, however, we are all to find our way to participating in stewardship. Some of us are able to volunteer on soup night or at the food pantry, others are able to participate in making the sleeping bags, still others help out with Stop the Stigma. Finally, others may not have the time or talent but are able to give generously to Sunday's collection.

All God asks of us is to give in whatever way we are able in order to further God's plan for His people. He desires our giving in a Christ like fashion in order to help the least of these. We are, each in our own way, to commit to making whatever commitment we are able, through donating our time, talent and/or treasure so that we all can further the Kingdom.

The Old Testament calls for us to tithe to the church. Leviticus 27:30 says, "A tithe of everything from the land, whether grain from the soil or fruit from the trees, belongs to the Lord: it is holy to the Lord." These gifts are a reminder that everything belongs to God and a portion is given back to God to thank him for what we receive.

We pledge so that the church is able to fulfill our mission which includes the ministries mentioned above and more. Every year the parish makes a budget and our pledging provides the vestry with

knowledge of what funds we have to do the work of the church. It is extremely important that, if possible, everyone pledges so that the vestry will be able to effectively budget for the coming year.

If one is able to increase their pledge in a given year that is wonderful but whatever the amount may be, five dollars, fifty, or more per week, the pledge is a sacred covenant with God that we are giving to see to it that the church can corporately do the work we are all called to do to further the Kingdom here on earth.

While there is guidance to tithe in the Old Testament, in the New Testament there is also a call for even more to be done. In Matthew 23:23 it says, "Woe unto you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! for ye pay tithe of mint and anise and cumin, and have omitted the weightier matters of the law, judgment, mercy, and faith: these ought ye to have done, and not to leave the other undone." God requires us to behave in a just fashion in addition to offering out of our abundance.

I believe that we here at St. Paul's are doing this in our ministerial work, reaching out to the community we are being a blessing to those in need out of our blessings, whether they be financial, time donation, or through our prayer for justice and mercy in the world.

We all have something to give out of our abundance. Let us each in our own way continue to be a blessing to one another in the name of the triune God through giving of our time, talent, treasure and/or prayer.








## Katherine Baker Warriner Memorial Service

It's been a warm, wet fall with foggy morinings. Without the cold nights, the sugar maples aren't as colorful as they can be, but there are still a couple stunners. The wet weather has caused an amazing variety of fungi to grow. They seem to be everywhere. Those below are jelli fungus and they come in orange and yellow. They are supposedly edible if boiled. (hmmm!) Spider webs, with their amazing symmetry, appear in the fall dew in the mornings. Milkweed has bloomed and the seedpods are spreading next year's plants through the wind and waiting for the monarch butterflies. Early fall, a beautiful time of year here.
