Pain of Loss

The pain of their absence, the crippling affliction of the moments you once shared together, and the struggle to understand the absolute finality of losing someone, is more than unbearable. Losing someone you love feels like the earth is shattering around you. How can you move on without this person? Are they really gone? The normal tasks of everyday suddenly seem impossible to complete without breaking down. The grief and trauma leave a mark on your heart.

The memories I have of the people I loved and lost are with me every day. The way my Nana was strong enough, even in her weakest moments, to hold my baby (her first Great Grandchild). My eyes filled with tears as I watched her touch the tip of her finger on his nose. He was only a few months old, and she got to witness the overwhelming joy in my eyes as I became a new mother. I show my son the pictures of them often, in hopes that he'll know her and who she was in my life.

No one can prepare you for the moment someone is truly gone. We spend our days getting angry and frustrated with those closest to us. It's funny how the saying goes, "we hurt those we love the most". I wonder why that is. Maybe it's because we don't know how else to channel our feelings and these people in our lives make us comfortable enough to express what is on our mind in the truest form. I don't know what it is, but it seems backwards to me. Although I find myself snapping at times and letting my frustrations get the best of me, I try to pray for everyone I love before I lay my head to rest at night. It is important for me to keep those people close to my heart even if we are miles apart.

I'll leave you with a quote from a Native American prayer that brings me to tears and touches my heart in ways I cannot put into words:" I give you this one thought to keep- I am with you still. I do not sleep. I am a thousand winds that blow, I am the diamond glints on snow, I am the sunlight on ripened grain, I am the gentle Autumn rain. When you awaken in the morning hush, I am the swift, uplifting rush of quiet birds in circled flight. I am the soft stars that shine at night. Do not think of me as gone- I am with you still- in each new dawn."

Deacon Liz's Weekly



This week I went to see Bold Independence: African American Quilts from the collection of David Wally, and Every Stitch Counts: Works from the Social Justice Sewing Academy, a national youth education program that bridges artistic expression with activism to advocate for social justice.

The exhibits were beautiful, soulful, and deeply thought provoking. The works in Every Stitch Counts particularly challenged us to reflect deeply on our baptismal covenant to seek peace and justice for all people.

The quilts in Bold Independence were from the early twentieth century and provided a glimpse into the history of black quilt making which was handed down by slaves. The museum provided correlating artwork from the museum's African collection to help us more fully understand the rich cultural ties to the patterns and meaning seen in the quilts. Some of the patterns in the quilts were meant as messages to fellow slaves regarding escaping from their masters. One I found particularly beautiful and striking in its message was Drunkard's Path which was created to let people know when they should take a circuitous route to freedom.

The other exhibit consisted of quilts which were more direct and honest about contemporary issues in society, from race relations and equality to food insecurity and climate issues.

The quilt that impacted me the most was of an American flag which was comprised of fabric with black figures on it and statistics sewn into the fabric about slaves for sale, thus advertising the goods available. It was truly provocative and quite a lesson about American history.

If you have an afternoon to take a ride down to Scranton, I highly recommend the exhibit for quilters and non-quilters alike. It is a slice of Americana worth experiencing. And is truly a gift to take the time to ponder the depth of the messages contained within the artworks. The exhibits will be there until December 27th. It is truly not to be missed!
