THE GOSPEL

Jesus set out and went away to the region of Tyre. He entered a house and did not want anyone to know he was there. Yet he could not escape notice, but a woman whose little daughter had an unclean spirit immediately heard about him, and she came and bowed down at his feet. Now the woman was a Gentile, of Syrophoenician origin. She begged him to cast the demon out of her daughter. He said to her, "Let the children be fed first, for it is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." But she answered him, "Sir, even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs." Then he said to her, "For saying that, you may go—the demon has left your daughter." So she went home, found the child lying on the bed, and the demon gone.

Then he returned from the region of Tyre, and went by way of Sidon towards the Sea of Galilee, in the region of the Decapolis. They brought to him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they begged him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, and put his fingers into his ears, and he spat and touched his tongue. Then looking up to heaven, he sighed and said to him, "Ephphatha," that is, "Be opened." And immediately his ears were opened, his tongue was released, and he spoke plainly. Then Jesus ordered them to tell no one; but the more he ordered them, the more zealously they proclaimed it. They were astounded beyond measure, saying, "He has done everything well; he even makes the deaf to hear and the mute to speak." (Mark 7:24-37)

This week marks the twentieth anniversary of September 11, 2001. It is difficult to believe that twenty years have passed in the blink of an eye. And yet for those who lost loved ones that day, nearly three thousand families were changed forever. The father, mother, son or daughter who was present for the holidays was there no longer. A place at the table remains empty to this day. The smile which was so captivating was no more. The comforting hug of a mother's love, absent. We grieve with those who lost dear ones that day.

And yet, we rejoice with our Father in Heaven that they were met by still other loved ones on the other side of the veil. Friends and relatives once lost to them, reunited in eternal bliss. While families here grieve for their loss, they have gratitude for the time that they had together on this plane and they wait in sure and certain hope for the time when they will be reunited.

We grieve too for a certain loss of surety, surety that while there were dangers on other shores, we seemed to be immune from attack. We heard for decades about conflicts in Israel, the Middle East, Ireland, Eastern Europe, Southeast Asia, and more. And yet in America we were safe because we had distance, separation from warring factions. We did what we could, diplomatically and militarily to aid nations under siege and felt that we were above the fray.

I remember that summer, being in Japan, thinking that things were not alright in the world, something was going on. Al Qaida had recently blown a hole through one of our ships in retaliation for something we did, and committed bombings that summer against tourists in Southeast Asia. I arrived home the morning of September eighth and was eternally grateful on the eleventh that I was home with my family, not trapped on the other side of the world.

So many things have changed since then, but one thing has not. Our need for and love of family and friends. Let us express our gratitude and love for those we are closest to and hold them tight because we know not what tomorrow will bring. Let us give thanks to God for the many blessings in our lives this day and evermore.
