Advent—New Beginnings and Old Traditions

As is the case every year, Advent, which begins on Sunday, November 28 is a time of contradictions. On one hand, we know that this season is an opportunity for quiet time and reflection as we anticipate the birth of our Savior and ready our hearts to receive Him. On the other hand, it is a time of hustle and bustle as we make preparations to celebrate Christmas. This year we have opportunities to address both.

Deacon Liz has suggested two resources for Advent which will be available the Sunday before Advent. One is a calendar which walks us through the days leading up to Christmas. The other is a booklet of meditations for daily use put out by the Church following the Way of Love. Each day offers one short idea on how to walk in love. As you wish, please take these aids and schedule a few minutes of quiet time each day to read and reflect. For those of you on the more "techy" side, there is *Advent Word* which is one word for each day received by email with a meditation.

In the weeks leading up to Christmas, several events dot the calendar. On Saturday, December 4 from 9-3, the **Country Store at St. Paul's** showcases a bake table, raffle baskets, and the North Pole Kitchen serving hot soup, hotdogs, chili, and walking tacos. This fun day of fellowship provides a day for the community to come into our church and the all the profits go to a local ministry. No need to be invited to help; we can use everyone in some capacity or another.

Our **Annual Memory Luncheon** takes place on Sunday, December 12 at noon following the service. A free lunch sponsored by Stop the Stigma gathers friends to remember and honor any loved ones in recovery or lost to addiction and those grieving any loss during the holidays. Come be with those who understand what you feel. No registration required. If St. Paul's parishioners will each bring a "brunchy" potluck dish for the meal, we will have a feast.

Coats for Our Community has a final distribution of free, warm winter coats on Wednesday, December 14 and Thursday, December 15 from 9-6 at St. Paul's. And finally, our Advent will culminate with our **candlelight Christmas Eve Service** at 5:00. All are welcome. Ask your friends and neighbors to join us for this beautiful, moving remembrance of Jesus' birth.

THE GOSPEL- Take away the stone

When Mary came where Jesus was and saw him, she knelt at his feet and said to him, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died." Old Picture of Early Rectory Found

In 1906, St. Paul's sold their rectory on South Main St. (Regan's Funeral Home) and purchased the old Benjamin R. Lyons house directly east of the church on Church St. across from the Presbyterian Church. St. Paul's rectors for the next 90 years would live in it while at St. Paul's. It was sold in 2000 to Greg and Eileen Myer, who still reside there. This early lithograph was found on a map of Montrose at the Historical Society.
