THE GOSPEL

One of the scribes came near and heard the Saducees disputing with one another, and seeing that Jesus answered them well, he asked him, "Which commandment is the first of all?" Jesus answered, "The first is, 'Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength.' The second is this, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no other

commandment greater than these." Then the scribe said to him, "You are right, Teacher; you have truly said that 'he is one, and besides him there is no other'; and 'to love him with all the heart, and with all the understanding, and with all the strength,' and 'to love one's neighbor as oneself,' —this is much more important than all whole burnt offerings and sacrifices." When Jesus saw that he answered wisely, he said to him, "You are not far from the kingdom of God."

After that no one dared to ask him any question. (*Mark 12:28-34*)

Fr. Bill's Morning Prayer

In our morning prayer we celebrate, though we are all apart currently. October winds and November chills are beginning to hem us in. Yet, cloistered as we are, in kitchen and around the glow of the old log fire, we are united in spirit, in prayer, warmed by your Gospel word, in this Autumnal season.

The Gospel for the 23rd Sunday has Jesus answering the question: "Which is the greatest of the Commandments?"---It is the 'old grey whistle test' of Judaism, much like "do you still love your wife?"

It is the 'hesed' of the covenant on Mount Sinai: "Remember Israel the Lord your God is one and you shall love the Lord your God with all your mind, heart and soul and your neighbor as yourself."-- The words were curtailed to a holy greeting: "The lord be in my mind, in my heart and in my soul." They were written on the smallest parchment, wore around the neck, put in a tube and attached to the house door. Every Jew knew these words. These were the words that they lived by.

The simplicity of Jesus' reply and the essence of the 'hesed' is Quaker like. And I say that because it has a silent power that ends all other debate. All you need is to sit and acknowledge your faith in God, love the God that you believe in and take that love and share it with others in the clear light of each day.

We are each and all called to that friendship and brother/sisterhood. It is the Tom Sawyer moment in our lives when we sit by the riverbank alone on a warm afternoon. Though the fish are not biting, we experience a peace and contentment with the world. All around creation speaks, flowers tilt in the breeze and the great giant green/blue dragonfly hums by. At that moment we seem to bridge the space between God and who we are called to be.

"All you need is love," said Lennon, all those years ago. He never knew that he was really summarizing the greatest of the commandments, for "love is all you need!"

Isolated, alone, distancing we too can borrow the wisdom of our Quaker friends, sitting quietly in our homes. God is love and we are called to love him and breathe that over into the lives of others. Become a Quaker in these days and see that glimpse of the poetic beauty that is 'the hesed of God'. Amen.


Trick or Treat
