THE GOSPEL- the first of his signs

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." And Jesus said to her, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." Now standing there were six stone water jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. J esus said to them, "Fill the jars with water." And they filled them up to the brim. He said to them, "Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward." So they took it. When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him, "Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now." Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him. (*John 2:1-11*)

Deacon Liz, View From the Pulpit

We asked Deacon Liz to share a biographical sketch of herself to help us get to know her. She provided the following:

The Rev. Elizabeth Grohowski is a native of New York. She was ordained to the Sacred Order of Deacons in July of 2021; St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Montrose, PA is her first position in ordained ministry.

Deacon Liz graduated from the School of Theology at The University of the South in Sewanee, Tennessee in May of 2021 with a Master of Divinity degree. Her academic interest at Sewanee was in the history of women in ministry up to and including the ordination of women as deacons, priests, and bishops. While at Sewanee, she was active on the pastoral care committee, sang with the Schola choir, and was appointed the head of the thurifers' guild, the St. Florian Guild. In her senior year, she was awarded a study grant to attend St. George's College in Jerusalem, Israel.

Prior to seminary, Deacon Liz was an active lay leader in the church. She was a mentor of an Education for Ministry (EfM) group, was involved in the New York Episcopal Cursillo movement, served in various aspects of ministry, and assisted in leading a centering prayer group. She participated in mission trips to Mexico and completed the Compostela di Santiago in 2015. She has a strong interest in pastoral care, adult formation, and spiritual direction, and has trained in music healing. She completed a unit of Clinical Pastoral Education at Reading Hospital in which she concentrated on end-of-life spiritual care.

Before discerning a call to ordained ministry, Deacon Liz worked in higher education administration and educational services for Math for America, as assistant to the president of the Auburn Theological Seminary at Union, and for her alma mater, The Manhattan School of Music. In her artistic work in the field of music, she worked for 30 years as a professional opera singer. She sang primarily with opera companies in the United States, including The Metropolitan Opera and The Lyric Opera of Chicago, as well as several other major opera companies. The furthest her singing took her from home was Japan in the summer of 2001 where she worked under the baton of Seiji Osawa, former music director of the Boston Symphony Orchestra.

In addition to her degree from The University of the South, she holds a Bachelor of Music degree in Opera, cum laude from the Hartt School of Music at The University of Hartford, Hartford, Connecticut, a Master of Music degree in Classical Vocal Performance from The Manhattan School of Music in New York, New York, and was a young artist at The Juilliard Opera Center in New York, New York.

Deacon Liz enjoys travel, decorating and design, knitting, and going to the movies.
