#### View from the Pew

Have you ever had an "ah-ha" moment, when something you had vaguely thought about before suddenly became clear? What had been a puzzle before, now makes perfect sense—a conscious realization due to some event that is simple and striking so you comprehend the true meaning or reality of what had eluded you.

It's coincidental, but we were talking about just this thing at coffee hour last Sunday. I mentioned that I had never fully understood forgiveness until a neighbor in Baltimore took advantage of our trust. I was angry and could not get beyond how he had used us. It was eating at me, and the fact that he did not seem in the least remorseful made it worse. One night, as I lay awake fretting, it suddenly occurred to me that forgiveness had nothing to do with him. It had everything to do with me. I could either let my anger continue to control my emotions regarding him, or I could forgive him, whether he was aware or not, and move on. I had an epiphany! Only then did I understand how someone like Immaculee Ilibagiza, who survived the Rwandan genocide, could forgive her family's murderers.

In most Christian traditions, January 6 is the Epiphany of Our Lord Jesus Christ. As Deacon Liz noted in her sermon last Sunday, it commemorates the revealing of Jesus as the Christ to the Gentiles in the persons of the Magi at Bethlehem.

The magi followed a star in the East and eventually the star settled over the place where Jesus lay in a manger. The magi were not fooled by the commonness of the surroundings. Rather, they recognized the King of the Jews, and they, who were not Jews, worshiped him and offered gifts signifying that his Kingship would be for all people. This was their, and our, Epiphany. Through a simple and striking scene, they understood God made manifest in the form of a helpless baby. An "ah-ha" moment.

May all our epiphanies bring us closer to God.

### THE GOSPEL -- Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews?

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:

`And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel.'

"Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road. (*Matthew 2:1-12*)
