The Garden

Springtime comes rolling round slowly in Susquehanna County, and with it gardening.

Gardeners wait all winter for springtime, getting excited by each seed catalogue that comes in the winter. But our wait is long. It snows here in April and we can't plant tomatoes until Memorial Day. We are patient and we wait.

I always thought there was a gardening gene you somehow inherited from some forbearer - perhaps a parent or grandparent. Love of gardening is genetic, it's in your makeup or it isn't. You like the feel of dirt or the smell of slightly decaying vegetation or not. You can't just decide on the spur of the moment that you are going to become a gardener. It doesn't work that way. It's coded in your DNA. By pure luck, I married someone who has her own gene. She got it from her grandmother and gardening is something we enjoy doing together.

I got my gene from my mother's father. I associate my earliest memories of him in his garden, sitting in an old aluminum lawn chair and smoking his corncob pipe, resting, holding a shovel. He had retired from the steel mill when I was four. My mother always said: "men need something to do when they retire," and for my grandfather, it was his garden. During the summer, I was often at my grandparent's house and I was his helper. My first job was weeding, a skill I still possess.



During the depression, Grandpa had rented a large plot about three miles from the house and grew everything in it for his family, walking there after a 12-hour shift. Grandma would can what he grew. During World War II, he also dug up the back yard and planted it completely. When I came along, he just had his back yard garden. During spring, there were cups and glass jars in the windows and all over the house with seedlings in them. They disappeared by May. He grew all his plants by seed. When he planted the first seeds, usually the peas, he would bless the garden and pray for a good season. He'd known good ones and bad ones.

He taught me when to plant root crops and how far apart to plant beans. What bugs were bad and how to check your fence for rabbit holes. And Tomatoes! Ah Tomatoes. Tomatoes were his specialty. We spent the most time on his tomatoes and he taught me what he knew. What I know about growing tomatoes I learned from him. I actually feel him smiling at me when I pick our red first one. A successful garden each year is measured by how your tomatoes did.

Visits to my grandparents 'house during the summer after church, even if you had just been there the week before, required an obligatory trip to the back yard. Grampa wanted to show off his garden, as we all do. Gardeners of course, are proud of what they produce and love to give it away. Who hasn't heard "Would you like some zucchini?"

So, here it is, April, another year. Last year's garden's trials and tribulations are forgotten. All things are possible. It's springtime, and almost time for a new garden. We are patient and we wait. I never said it to him but will now. Thank you Pap – I bless this garden.

The Gospel reminds us of the return of the Ark of the Covenant in the Book of Samuel where King David dances before the Ark as it enters Jerusalem. The narrative is both a celebration and also somehow prophetic. It is both joyous and sad.

To this point Jesus has avoided Jerusalem, the Temple, the Pharisees, and the Sanhedrin. He has been content to work among the poor, the sick and the people of Galilee. Jerusalem brings a certain foreboding.

Palm Sunday is the beginning of Holy Week. When we enter it, we begin to participate in the Paschal Mystery of Easter. We are invited on a spiritual journey whereby we identify with the suffering of Christ, die to our old self, and rise anew with Christ on Easter Sunday. Central to this theology is the Procession of the Paschal candle into the church at the Vigil. Traditionally it is lowered into the water of Baptism. Then we are invited to renew our Baptismal Promises.

Easter is for us about renewal. We forget that when we hold ourselves guilty of our sins, failures, weaknesses and past. We forget that in Baptism we are reborn and since Baptism is a continuous activity and not one act in the past; we are continually reborn into the forgiveness of Christ. To think otherwise is to believe that Christ death and sacrifice was simple not enough for our forgiveness.

This is our prayer, that we walk through this Holy Week in the footsteps of Christ. If only our nation could walk in those footsteps. If only our world could walk in those footsteps! It will not happen. The world does not believe and because it does not believe, it does not walk.

This week we who believe, walk. Amen


A Busy Week
