Vestry Highlights: March 24, 2022

Our meeting scheduled for March 17 was postponed until March 24 due to lack of a quorum.

Lynne opened the meeting with prayer and we approved the agenda.

We approved the minutes of February 17, 2022.

Mother Liz read the Bible study scripture Luke 15:4-10, which are the parables of the lost sheep and the lost coin (preceding the parable of the Prodigal Son.). God, our Father, runs to meet us when we repent and return to him.

Mother Liz thanked the parish for hosting her ordination and for her beautiful white stole, which we gave her. She reported that she attended the Clergy Lenten Day conference and the meeting of Convocation I. She encouraged us to attend Gather 22, a formation event sponsored by the Diocese. She noted that archives (Vestry minutes) are missing from 1980-2010. She presented the Holy Week schedule. The memorial service for Mary Jane Syle will be on April 26 at 1:00. There will be a memorial service for Simon Pease in April or May.

The Vestry voted unanimously to donate this month's gas royalty check to St. Vladimir Ukrainian church in Scranton. They will

forward the funds to their Diocese for use in Ukraine.

We will provide Easter treats for the recipients of Meals on Wheels. Donations toward this endeavor are much appreciated. We will dye eggs on April 1 at 5:00 and then fill the treat bags with the eggs, jellybeans, and a small bag of chocolates on Sunday, April 3 after church.

We have added some communication responsibilities to Kate, our new parish administrator's, job.

We accepted the Treasurer's report. The Vestry approved an additional monthly withdrawal of funds from our interest in the DIT. We may not need these additional funds through the entire year.

Fourth Sunday of Lent, March 27th

Jerusalem, my happy home, When shall I come to thee? When shall my sorrows have an end? Your joys when shall I see?

Jerusalem, Jerusalem,
God grant that I may see
Your endless joy, and of the same

THE GOSPEL- he was lost and has been found.

Now the tax collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to Jesus. And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying, "This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them." So Jesus told them this parable:

"There was a man who had two sons. The younger of them said to his father, 'Father, give me the share of the property that will belong to me.' So he divided his property between them. A few days later the younger son gathered all he had and traveled to a distant country, and there he squandered his property is dissolute living. After he had spent everything, there was a severe famine in that whole country, and he began to be in need. So he went and hired himself out to a citizen of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed pigs. He longed to fill his stomach with the pods that the pigs were eating, but no one gave him anything. "When he came to his senses, he said, 'How many of my father's hired servants have food to spare, and here I am starving to death! I will set out and go back to my father and say to him: Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I am no longer worthy to be called your son; make me like one of your hired servants.' So he got up and went to his father. But while he was still a long way off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion for him; he ran to his son, threw his arms around him and kissed him. "The son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I am no longer worthy to be called your son. "But the father said to his servants, 'Quick! Bring the best robe and put it on him. Put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. Bring the fattened calf and kill it. Let's have a feast and celebrate. For this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found.' And they began to celebrate.

Now his eldest son was in the field. When he came and approached the house, he heard music and dancing. So he called one of the servants and asked him what was going on. 'Your brother has come,' he replied, 'and your father has killed the fattened calf because he has him back safe and sound.' "The older brother became angry and refused to go in. So his father went out and pleaded with him. But he answered his father, 'Look! All these years I've been slaving for you and never disobeyed your orders. Yet you never gave me even a young goat so I could celebrate with my friends. But when this son of yours who has squandered your property with prostitutes comes home, you kill the fattened calf for him!' "'Then the father said to him, 'Son you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. But we had to celebrate and rejoice, because this brother of yours was dead and has come to life; he was lost and has been found."" (Luke 15: 1-3, 11b-32)

View from the Pulpit

There is something about yesterday's Gospel that is strangely haunting. It was the story of the Prodigal Son from Luke Chapter 15. It is perhaps the best known of all Jesus' parables and maybe the most complicated.

It is tempting to ask where the reader situates himself in the story. Do we journey with the Prodigal to a far, far land, or do we stand at the gate with the mourning father? Or have we already cut ties with the Prodigal and all our sympathies now lie with the faithful son?

Jesus is looking into the eyes and hearts of the Pharisees and the Scribes and is asking them a deep and meaningful question. "Do you truly believe that this Promised Land, this land given to the descendants of Joseph and the Kingdom of heaven, is only for you the blessed? I tell you that you are wrong for I have come to raise up the fallen and to heal the afflicted."

We could stand at the gate of our own church and ask the same question: 'who gets in and who stays out?'

The story of the Prodigal Son is the story that answers the question: "What is the nature of the God we choose to worship?"---Faith is not about jumping through hoops. It is not a race nor a contest. It is not about status, honors nor titles. Faith is about a relationship of love, a love that conquers all.

The Pharisees do not understand, and if the Scribes comprehend it is not a concept they wish to accept. Nothing has changed in two thousand years. We still live in a world of the 'haves' and 'the have-nots'. We still live in a world where the 'blessed' look down on the 'afflicted.' We still live in a world where love is esoteric and not universal.

"Save us Lord from the love of the blessed! Give us a church of the unwashed, the prisoner, the hobo, the refugee, the sinner and O yes, the Prodigal Son. But most of all Lord, give us the Spirit of the loving father." Amen.

April 1st, Egg Dying








Old Newspaper Found

Kate Bennett, our new Administrator, found this interesting article in an old *Montrose Independent* newspaper in the walls of a room at home she was working on. Dated October 27, 1937, the paper listed all Montrose church service times. St. Mark's was also listed. At that time, St. Paul's had two services on Sunday; 8:30 Holy Communion, and 11:00 Morning Prayer. Church School was 9:45. Rev. Steinmetz, the rector, had arrived at St. Paul's that May and would serve until 1945.
