View from the Pulpit- Mother Liz

My heart has been very heavy since last weekend. As I am sure you must have heard by now, a young white man from Conklin, dressed in military style gear and drove up to Buffalo. Upon his arrival, he sought out the section of town where the black people lived. He went into their local grocery store and started shooting, specifically targeting blacks. He shot and killed ten and three more were injured.

A retired police officer, Aaron Salter, attempted to stop him, but was unable to do so because of the shooters body armor. He was one of those shot and killed by the gunman. The officer has been hailed as a hero for his valiant attempt to stop the mass shooting.

One woman was shot and killed because she was at the front of the store, but her boyfriend was spared because he had already headed to the back to pick out some groceries. A little girl hid in a cooler to escape the gunfire. All that stood between ordinary people and death was chance. Where did they happen to be in the store upon the terrorist's arrival?

He posted a manifesto online and then went live with the shooting. Authorities say he considered other targets such as a church, but ultimately the grocery store was chosen to inflict as much terror as possible among members of the community. He wanted them to feel unsafe going about their daily routine. He wanted them to suffer the paralyzing fear of not knowing where or when their lives would be in danger.

What made him do it? Hate and fear.

Another man, this time in California, went to a Presbyterian Church on Sunday and open fire. The elderly congregants were in the middle of a luncheon and once he chained the doors to make their escape impossible, he killed one and injured five. He was Chinese and they were Taiwanese. What made him do it? Hate and fear.

It's difficult not to feel helpless in the face of this kind of hatred. What can we do? I have been praying for many hours since these heinous crimes were perpetrated by these fearful, cowardly men. Praying for the families of those killed, injured, and traumatized simply because they were in the wrong place at the wrong time. Praying for justice for the victims. Praying for those in power to find a way to put an end to senseless violence. Praying for the killers who harbor so much hatred for those they perceive to be different. I have also been praying for those who may be close to someone who harbors such hatred for his/ her fellow human beings, that they will have the courage to come forward if they fear what someone's intentions might be.

As we have been taught in NYC since 9/11, "If you see something, say something." Finally, remember Jesus' instruction to his disciples, which we heard on Sunday. Love one another. Just as I have loved you, you should love one another. Jesus did not say love one another as long as they look or act like you. He said love one another, period. Those are our marching instructions. So let us do as Jesus' new commandment would have us do, and may God have mercy on the souls those who are violent.
