### **18 Photos this week**

Jesus said to them, "Children, you have no fish, have you?" They answered him, "No." He said to them, "Cast the net to the right side of the boat, and you will find some." So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in because there were so many fish. That disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord!" When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he put on some clothes, for he was naked, and jumped into the sea. But the other disciples came in the boat, dragging the net full of fish, for they were not far from the land, only about a hundred yards off. When they had gone ashore, they saw a charcoal fire there, with fish on it, and bread. Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish that you have just caught." So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore, full of large fish, a hundred fifty-three of them; and though there were so many, the net was not torn. Jesus said to them, "Come and have breakfast." Now none of the disciples dared to ask him, "Who are you?" because they knew it was the Lord. Jesus came and took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish. This was now the third time that Jesus appeared to the disciples after he was raised from the dead.

When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my lambs." A second time he said to him, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Tend my sheep." He said to him the third time, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" Peter felt hurt because he said to him the third time, "Do you love me?" And he said to him, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you."

Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep. Very truly, I tell you, when you were younger, you used to fasten your own belt and to go wherever you wished. But when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will fasten a belt around you and take you where you do not wish to go." (He said this to indicate the kind of death by which he would glorify God.) After this he said to him, "Follow me." *(John 21:1-19)* 

### View from the Pew – Mother Liz

The season of Easter is the time of year we particularly focus on resurrection. And what precedes resurrection is death. What is the opposite of death? I know what your answer is...life. It seems obvious, right? Well, that is the wrong answer. I'm sure you are thinking well, how could that be the wrong answer? The correct answer is birth. Birth is the opposite of death. Life is what happens between birth and death. In fact, life begins before birth and, we believe, continues after death.

We, as Christians, believe in a rebirth. too Baptism is when we die to sin and are reborn in Christ. Baptized Christians are given the opportunity to grow not only physically by being nurtured with food, water, rest, and exercise, but we are also given the opportunity to grow spiritually by being nurtured with liturgy, prayer, bible study, and contemplation. Throughout life our life in God matures, grows, develops and we are formed as followers of Christ until we are called home by God as was Jesus, God's other beloved child, his first born, the Crucified One. I have been watching Call the Midwife for the past few months. The show primarily deals with pregnancy and birth and the sacredness of the birthing process. However, there are also moments within the series in which one of the midwives is present through the other most sacred of times, the dying process. At both ends of life the midwives deal with the one at the center of the event but in the midwifery of the dying, the midwife also attends to the needs of the family. (The presence of fathers and other family members in the birthing room was not something that happened during the time periods in which the series takes place.) While I have never had a baby, so I have not experienced the sacredness of the moment of birth from a mother's perspective, I have had the honor and privilege of being with my father at the time of his death. I was alone with him and had my hand upon his heart as it stopped beating. Two of the nurses were outside his room. I waited for a few minutes before I got their attention to inform them that I thought he had died. It was as if time stood still. God blessed me, allowing me to be present as he called my father home.

The grieving process is different for each one of us and it is different for every person we mourn because our relationships are different with everyone. We spend this concerted time every year during the Easter season, celebrating the resurrection of Jesus Christ to remind ourselves that He is our example of dying and rising to new life; first, at our baptism, throughout our lives when we turn from sin and back to God, and finally, when our physical bodies die, and we rise in the glory of God to the resurrection life.

This day, may we continue to grow in the resurrection of Jesus Christ confident that at the last day each of us will rise in the glory of God everlasting and we will be reunited with those we love but no longer see.

I just wanted to thank everyone who came to my retirement party on April 27. It was great to see everyone!" -Betty Depue



### This week in History

May 14, 1796- First Vaccination- English physician Edward Jenner vaccinates an 8-year-old boy

for protection against smallpox. After observing that milkmaids were generally immune to smallpox, Jenner postulated that the pus in the blisters that milkmaids received from cowpox (a disease similar to smallpox, but much less virulent) could protect someone from smallpox. He then went on to test and prove his theory. Although others had previously observed that those who contracted cowpox were immune to smallpox, it was Jenner who proved that the pus from someone with cowpox would provide immunity. It was estimated at the



time that 60% of the population acquired smallpox and 20% of the population died of it. It is said that his work has saved more lives than the work of any other human. Smallpox eventually became the first disease eradicated by man.
