View from the Pulpit: Father Bill

In our morning prayer we pray that your Holy Spirit may come amongst us and bring us renewal. For renewal is something that we need to sweep away the clouds of doubt. Not a renewal that brings change but a renewal that reminds us of the pristine and ancient traditions in which we stand.

Our Baptism creaks with age, hanging on ancient words. We renounce some devil as if he lived next door, without ever giving him a name. When we really mean that we reject hate and in all its forms. Racism, discrimination, intolerance, abuse, violence, terror, slavery, crime, bigotry, jingoism, fascism, supremacy and all the 'isms.

Baptism calls us each day to follow our beliefs, teaching, understandings and wisdoms and give them flesh. Who really are the 'lost sheep'? Often it is not us, we are fine. No, Baptism calls on us to be the shepherd and go looking, searching and we will not find the sheep we are looking for in a church.

The whole point of Luke's story is that Jesus was speaking and eating with sinners and tax-collectors. They were the lowest of the low, the untouchables of Jewish society. They were the lost sheep of the tribes of Israel. So where do we find the 'lost sheep' of our day? Finding the 'lost sheep' is not an invitation to take a place in a church pew. Finding the 'lost sheep' is first a change in our own mindset.

We stand uneasy contemplating 'the lost sheep'. We do not mind so much when the Parable story, refers to ourselves as the 'lost'. For that only brings Christ searching for us and speaks of redemption. It is the thought that we are the shepherd and must go searching, because it takes us out of our comfort zone. Now we are treading through marshland unsure of our footing.

Hospitals, where we can catch anything; Nursing Homes with old people, reminding us of our own mortality; prisons where we associate everyone with violence; Funeral Homes where we need deal with someone else's loss and grief. Orphans with that dead look of desperation in their eyes. The 'lost sheep' are not as cuddly as the Bible pictures portray them.

Lost in a world of drugs, living always with a 'bin load of bottles'. It is hard to find your way when you no longer know how you ever got there. We still have 'untouchables', we just rarely talk about them in church. Now we need ask: "are our 'big red doors open or shut"?

Yet, Lord, there lies our renewal, the living Gospel in all its bare glory. Help us to be shepherds, Lord. Help us to dare to help the 'lost sheep'. Amen.

Joe Weldon and I shared a simple but most amusing sort of secret which with only a single sign from either of us, gleaned a knowing grin. But before I reveal that bit of humor. . . . This week's Gospel according to Luke:

Jesus said to the disciples, "There was a rich man who had a manager, and charges were brought to him that this man was squandering his property. So he summoned him and said to him, `What is this that I hear about you? Give me an accounting of your management, because you cannot be my manager any longer.' Then the manager said to himself, `What will I do, now that my master is taking the position away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. I have decided what to do so that, when I am dismissed as manager, people may welcome me into their homes.' So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he asked the first, `How much do you owe my master?' He answered, `A hundred jugs of olive oil.' He said to him, `Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it fifty.' Then he asked another, `And how much do you owe?' He replied, `A hundred containers of wheat.' He said to him, `Take your bill and make it eighty.' And his master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light. And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone, they may welcome you into the eternal homes.

"Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much. If then you have not been faithful with the dishonest wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? And if you have not been faithful with what belongs to another, who will give you what is your own? No slave can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth."
