View from the Pulpit: Mother Liz

It's back to school time! The kids are headed back to school and here at St. Paul's we are starting up Bible Study on Wednesday nights. Join us as we gather to meditate on the word and have a spirit-filled discussion of the Gospel for the week.

My new schedule beginning in September is Tuesday – Thursday to accommodate my participation in the Vital and Effective Leadership Institute (VELI). This is a monthly meeting on Tuesdays for newly ordained clergy and clergy new to the diocese. The Diocese of Central Pennsylvania and the Diocese of Bethlehem will be partnering to provide a strong program. The Canon Barbara and Canon Melinda from our diocese and Canon Chris and Dean Sarah from Central Pennsylvania will be leading our discussions and seasoned clergy from both diocese will provide local mentoring support.

Topics range from ministry in context to stewardship, staff management, family systems, self-care, best practices in ministry and an Easter debrief. At the end of the year in May, we will gather in person to worship together to celebrate the end of the year. Having been with you for a year, I have been navigating many of these areas already, however, there is always more to learn. So, I too am headed back to school in a manner of speaking. I look forward to lively conversations with my new colleagues here in DioBeth and with clergy from Central PA too.

Last week Stop the Stigma presented the International Drug Overdose Awareness Day event. Several organizations provided information for the those gathered, there was a presentation on supportive messaging regarding addiction and recovery, someone in recovery shared his story of hope, and we rang a bell in remembrance for those we love and lost to addiction this year. Refreshments were enjoyed by all. A special thank you to the United Fire Company for the use of their hall. Needless to say, hardly a drop of rain fell on the gathering.

This week I attended the Homeless Community Task Force with our county commissioners, and we heard from representatives from Children and Youth Services, the Susquehanna Housing Authority, Trehab, the Women's Resource Center, and Tiny House Village. It was inspiring to learn about the services offered to those in need in our community and about how they can access them. We also heard about the challenges we face as a support community, from affordable housing availability, to transportation, and funding. The various agencies spoke about the collaboration that takes place between them in order to achieve positive outcomes for those they serve.

There was also discussion about perceived stigmatization by those in need when accessing services. When folks seek assistance, they sometimes feel as though they are being looked down upon for their circumstances. Therefore, it was suggested that when assisting them, do their best to treat them with respect because, despite the fact that they are in need, they are human beings. The thing that struck me especially was hearing about someone in dire circumstances attending a church that treated them with disrespect. She said that we are all God's children, aren't we supposed to love one another. I replied that what she said was true and that we are all sinners by virtue of our humanity, that it is God's place to judge, not ours, and that if they attend a church that makes them feel unwelcome, please continue to look for another because there are churches who will welcome them with open arms

View from the Pew:



One late summer I had a monarch butterfly caterpillar that was munching happily on a milkweed leaf. I had it in a jar with air holes poked in the top to let the air exchange in this little guy's new habitat. When they are ready, the caterpillar sticks its hind end to the underside of a leaf or branch and hang upside down, forming the shape of the letter J and from there, forms into a beautiful green chrysalis with a gold band before emerging

as a butterfly.

Somehow I had miscalculated the time it would go through its metamorphosis process and thought it would complete sooner than it did. So, the chrysalis ended up making a 1,588 mile trip with me to Saint George Island, FL, then Grovetown, GA before it finally broke out of its shell into an alluring and breathtaking adult monarch butterfly. Its colors so vivid and contrasting, like something printed using a fresh color ink cartridge on the proper printer paper. From there I set it free and hope that its internal compass wasn't all messed up thinking it was still in northeastern Pennsylvania.

Speaking of setting something free, this past Friday, I had to let my cat Hazel and long-time furry companion go after coming ill several months ago. She really was my constant companion, always ready to greet me coming home and keep my lap warm when I would sit in my chair. It was the right thing to do, but what a difficult decision to make letting her go. Bon voyage, Hazel.

This week's Gospel according to Luke:

Or what king, going out to wage war against another king, will not sit down first and consider whether he is able with ten thousand to oppose the one who comes against him with twenty thousand? If he cannot, then, while the other is still far away, he sends a delegation and asks for the terms of peace. So therefore, none of you can become my disciple if you do not give up all your possessions."


Our thanksgivings:














Morning Has Broken – Susquehanna Summer Sunrise



Vestry Highlights August 24, 2022

Mother Liz opened the meeting with prayer and we approved the agenda.

We approved the minutes of the June 16, 2022 meeting.

Mother Liz read the Bible study scripture Luke 14:1, 7-14 in which Jesus tells a parable about humbling oneself and inviting the sick, lonely, homeless into our lives without expectation of repayment.

Mother Liz reported (among other things) on her discretionary fund; that she delivered sleeping bags to Keystone Mission in Scranton; she attended Morning Prayer at Meadow View (third Wednesday of the month at 10 a.m.); preached at St. Matthew's on August 7; held Altar Guild training; and has advertised for an organist to fill in once/month.

It was noted for the minutes that installation of the new water heater for the kitchen and the tree removal cost were approved by email.

We discussed results of an assessment of ministry priorities that was taken by each Vestry member and some options of how we might proceed with strategic planning.

We approved donations from our gas royalties to the Remembrance Book (names of those who died since last Diocesan Convention) which goes to United Thank Offering; to the Interfaith Backpack/shoe program for this school year; our china dishes to South Montrose Community Church which will have a commercial dishwasher; and purchase of a heavy duty sewing machine to help our Sleeping Bag ministry.

We reviewed and accepted the Treasurer's report.
