# View from the Pulpit: Father Bill

In the year 1918 on the 11th day of the 11th month and at the 11th hour, the guns on the Western Front fell silent. Millions of men had died in the four years of the First World War. So much so, that a generation of leaders, businessmen, and inheritors were forever gone from the early 20th century.

They left a vacuum that would fuel the 'great depression,' and be responsible for the demise and sale of so many estates, mansions, and grand houses. Writers of history would say that the cream of a whole generation had died on the muddy fields of Flanders.

Yet it was not those young men who suffered, for they were dead and buried beneath white crosses. No, it was the parents, young wives, fiancées and siblings that were left to bear the burden of sorrow and loss that never went away. Beginning in November of 1918 if ever 'healing was needed, that was the month, the day, and the hour.

Vera Britain was a young woman waiting for her fiancé to return from the war. He did not return. All she received was a letter from the War Ministry that he was KIA. (Killed in action.) The loss would stay with her for the rest of her life.

On this Remembrance weekend, we pray for all who have lost loved ones. Whether they be to war, illness, covid or whatever. So many who have served our nation die a death that takes decades. It is the 'Long Goodbye' of someone who truly died for their country. Today we pray for them, and we pray for all who loved them.

Healing is a process, it should begin with the hugs of friends, and end with our acknowledgement that the pain in our heart is one carved by the name of the one we love.

May they rest in peace. Amen.

**Community Service** 

My first real introduction to community service was about 30 years ago when I was stationed in Scotland. It started out as a way to bolster annual evaluation marks and was not altogether altruistic at first. The service was geared towards giving support to a local senior citizens day care program in the village where my wife, newborn son, and I lived. I ended up getting a Scottish small bus driver's license to pick up the residents at their homes and bringing them to their day care center. During the day, we would play games, have cookouts, or put puzzles together. One woman even knitted an outfit for our one year old son. This work related service ended up becoming my sanity break from military life which resulted in benefiting not only myself but also this older generation of such warm and caring people.

After my retirement someone asked what I wanted to do with myself. "Helping others" was my answer. They were thinking along the lines of professional development or something; but to me it was development. Community involvement and interacting in a more meaningful way, rather than trying another way of making a buck. Giving back and not just taking.

I have made some really good friends along the way, like at Saint Paul's where we do community activities such as soup night, making sleeping bags for those in need, coats for the community, Easter treats, bread basket donations, and even getting exercise by raking leaves on the church grounds. And we have a lot of fun together, all with a common goal in mind. Humanity. Or, simply, sharing all of this by writing down what is on your mind to share with others in these weekly articles.

## This week's Gospel according to Luke:
