View from the Pulpit: Father Bill

Awake from your sleep

Advent One has a second reading from Romans 13. Paul is writing to the Christians in Rome. His words are rather frightening, probably written late into the night, on a hard wooden table by lamplight.

If Nero (63AD) has not started his persecution of the Christians yet, then it is close. Paul's warning 'to awake from their sleep,' could have been addressed to Israel by any of the prophets. For that matter, it can apply to each of us today, this First Sunday of Advent.

Advent is full of these readings in the lectionary. Note the words that Paul uses: time; salvation; believers; near; darkness; light; Jesus Christ.' The season is full of repentance, change, expectation and coming events. Paul tells the Christians that the real darkness and danger lies in the blindness they themselves create through drunkenness, debauchery, hate, jealousy and quarreling.

We have to take something from this passage, and it is surely that we too can be blind. Constantly we are asked by Christ to awake to a new reality, that of putting our own interests to one side and embracing the needs of others. There is a blindness that we inflict on ourselves, says Paul, when we take the path into the darkness of sin and vice and away from the moral compass that God gives us.

Advent speaks of that 'few' who have remained faithful, stepping out of the darkness of the Old Testament to prepare the way for the Messiah. We light a candle to point the way to the 'Coming of Christ' in our lives. By the time of Paul's writing the Messiah has come, taught and been rejected. Now Paul wants the Christians to wear Christ like a badge or a robe. "Put on Christ" he says.

Imagine! Imagine if we too took Paul literally and 'put on Christ!' Maybe that was what Christ meant by his 'second coming!' Maybe we are 'the second coming!'--If we indeed copied what Jesus did and really did reach out to others that would be precisely what we are.

Take advent seriously. "Awake from your sleep! Put on Christ!" Amen.

Forward Movement has announced the 2022 reflection words for AdventWord, a global online advent calendar and community of disciples. For nearly a decade AdventWord has inspired followers of Jesus who wish to add an accessible prayer practice to their daily routine during this holy season.

beginning Sunday, November 27.



Participants can sign up to receive this daily message, in English and Spanish, by email or by following AdventWord on social media. For all who are technically inclined, please sign up to participate!

Many followers join the creativity each year by sharing their own personal reflections across social media using #AdventWord. Participants respond with photos, written responses, crafts, drawings, poems, found art, and other creative expressions inspired by the day's selected word.

"This year we enlisted volunteer community members to help with the selection of prompt words from the daily lectionary readings," said Richelle Thompson, managing editor at Forward Movement. "The online gathering of dozens of AdventWord community members was an inspiring way to kick off the planning for 2022 and a strong reminder that AdventWord is community-driven."



Are you Safe Church compliant?

Maintaining your required trainings and clearances is vital because it helps us to keep all the people in our congregations safe. Episcopal Church canons require all people who have contact with children in an Episcopal Church to take online trainings to learn best practices, appropriate boundaries, and who to contact if they need help or suspect child abuse. Both Episcopal Church canons and Commonwealth of Pennsylvania laws require everyone who has contact with children and those with any sort of leadership position in the church to obtain background checks.

If you are a clergy person, lay employee, vestry member, volunteer who works with children, or a keyholder in the church, there are steps you need to take to be in compliance with Pennsylvania law and the Episcopal Church Canons.

The learning modules and Safe Church Training site have been recently updated. Learn more about what you need to do in order to be compliant and to keep your church safe. Contact Kate Aukema in the office if you have any questions or concerns about Safe Church compliancy.

Kate will be contacting those whose compliancy status is about to expire to remind them that they must complete the modules to renew their status. It only takes about an hour to complete the modules for renewal.
