View from the Pulpit: Mother Liz

River Through the Desert by Richard Sewell – Lenten Book Study

For centuries, Christians have recognized that they can enter more fully into Jesus's own journey by making a pilgrimage to the Holy Land. But in the midst of a spiritually disorienting pandemic that restricted travel, pilgrimage seemed impossible. River through the Desert asks us to think again. Written in the darkest days of the COVID pandemic, this series of meditations invites us to reimagine what it means to travel with Jesus during Lent.

In weekly reflections, Richard Sewell takes readers step by step through a landscape riven with the traces of God. As he stops at the Sea of Galilee and as he prays in the Garden of Gethsemane, Sewell reveals that the apparently arid landscape of our own lives can yield surprising nourishment when we take time for prayer, Scripture, and meditation. Ideal for a self-directed retreat or for a Lenten reading group, River through the Desert will be a dependable guide as you continue your spiritual journey. – Information From Amazon.com

My pilgrimage to the Holy Land was a once in a lifetime experience. I highly recommend it for everyone, but not everyone will have a chance to travel to Israel and Palestine in person. This book presents us with an opportunity to take a virtual Lenten pilgrimage and contemplate the land and it's impact on the ministry of Jesus in the first century.

The group will meet on six Wednesdays in Lent beginning March 1 at 4:30pm. We will start right into our time of study, having prepared for the session by reading the reflection and watching the associated video beforehand. (If anyone needs to watch the video for the week at the church, we can screen it at 4:15 pm.) We will discuss things that struck us from the week's reflection and video. Then we'll read the Gospel passage and finally discuss the questions at the end of the reading. All those who choose to, are welcome to remain at the end of the discussion for a light meal which will begin between 5:30 and 6 pm. We aim to conclude the evening by 7 pm. In week one we will visit the desert and consider Jesus' time there as well as considering the time spent there by the Hebrews who wandered in the desert for 40 years. In addition, we will hear about the monasteries and monks who have chosen to live in the desert. We will discuss Matthew's Gospel passage in which Jesus is tempted as his time of fasting and prayer comes to an end, as well as contemplating what it might be like to spend time in the desert ourselves. This week's Gospel according to Matthew:






Holy – Smoley

A Gaggle of Warriners – 1927 Picture Found

John Warriner's grandfather, Samuel Dexter Warriner (1867-1942) donated the money to build the present Parish Hall. It was started in1926 and finished in 1927. Bishop Talbot dedicated the building on May 29, 1927. It cost \$75,000. Our fireplace front below notes that it was dedicated to Samuel's father, Rev. Edward Warriner. The family picture was taken on the day of the dedication. Samuel Warriner is directly in the middle in the back. John's father is not in the picture because he was studying at Princeton.
