

View from the Pew:

Early last month, my family embarked on a trip to San Diego and will be finally arriving home this Saturday. My wife and I, daughter, and two grandchildren drove out and the rest flew. What an appropriate time of year to drive and really appreciate the beauty and grand scale of this country. Virtually coast to coast, we passed through 11 states, seeing the Grand Canyon and Horseshoe Bend, both which are canyons formed by the Colorado River; the flat prairie lands of the Midwest, finally culminating in the spectacular views of the Pacific Ocean. Even boarding the USS Midway, a retired aircraft carrier, the smells of which brought back immediate memories of seagoing Navy days.

Happy Independence Day to all. What a great 247 year old tradition this national holiday has become. This land transitioned from a group of rebel immigrants and native inhabitants to a country of patriots and citizens. 
