View from the Pulpit:

Last month while I was scrolling on Facebook I came across a post for a little free pantry that was placed outside a church in Ohio. This made me think of the many people in our area who are food insecure. Families, some with two parents, others single-parent led households, elderly folks, all struggling financially and unable to me their basic needs. While unemployment maybe at a record low, underemployment is still a serious issue in the country and here in Susquehanna county.

Many of our local helping institutions require people to meet specific guidelines in order to receive assistance. In order for them to be able to assist as many people as possible, there are limits placed on how much assistance any one person or family may receive. In addition, there are those who experience great shame because of their need and avoid asking for help. That is where the little free pantry comes in. Since it is free will, and not

guarded, all who are in need may come and take what they need any time of day or night, no questions asked.

This is where we come in. The way that the little free pantry works best, is that those who have need, they may take what they need. For those who have been blessed by God's abundance, they may offer assistance by giving of their abundance and placing pantry items in the pantry for those in need. What is needed first, before pantry items, is the donation of a pantry. My hope that someone has an old hanging wardrobe in their garage, attic, or barn that they might be willing to donate so we could outfit it with shelves in order to turn it into a pantry.

Please e-mail me or call the office if you by any chance have an old wardrobe that's still in reasonable condition that you would be willing to donate that we could use for a pantry. The pantry will be placed outside next to the parish house entrance so that people could access it at any time day or night.

View from the Pew:

The traveling nurse up the street, who has been our neighbor's caretaker for many months now, injured her toe and asked me to take her to EMHS Emergency Room. I was happy to help out as she has no family around. On our way, we had a discussion about finding the goodness in people. She told me, "My daughter says, 'Mama, no matter where you go, you always find good people.'" She is a lovely, Christian woman; hard not to like. One is easily drawn to her because she is so open and kind and patient.

I know she struggles with the person she cares for who can be very difficult at times. It brought to mind the number of people each of us may struggle with over a lifetime. Last month, at the Mobile Food Pantry, we had a woman come through who was angry and belligerent. I can only guess that something had pushed her over the edge that day. Her lashing out was probably a way of venting, rather than anger at any particular person.

When packing up our brother for his move to Florida, I came across a paper that had been given to him at some point by a religious group reaching out to the residents at his assisted living facility. I'm glad I read it instead of tossing it in the trash, because, though simple, it is true. Through kindness and patience and diligent care, our brother blossomed. I share the words with you here.

When a flashlight grows dim or quits working, do you just throw it away? Of course not! You change the batteries.

When people you care about mess up, do you cast them aside? Of course not! You help them to change their batteries.

Some people need AA-Attention and Affection.

Others need AAA-Attention, Affection, and Acceptance.

Some people need C-Compassion.

Others need D-Direction.

And if they still don't seem to shine, simply sit with them quietly, and share your Light.



LAST SUNDAY – Twelfth Sunday After Pentecost – August 20, 2023


There's a wideness in God's mercy, like the wideness of the sea. There's a kindness in God's justice, which is more than liberty.
