View from the Pulpit: Mother Liz

Though ADVENT (literally "arrival") has been observed for centuries as a time to contemplate Christ's birth, most people today have no idea of what it means or of its importance. For the vast majority of us, December flies by in a flurry of activities, and "the holiday season" ends up being the most stressful time of the year.

It is also a time of contrasting emotions. We may be eager, or frazzled; sentimental, or indifferent. One minute we glow at the thought of gathering with family and friends; the next we feel completely lonely. Hope is often mingled with anxiety; anticipation can be overridden by anguish. We sense that there are deeper meanings of the season, but grasp at them in vain; and in the end, all the hustle and bustle leave us feeling frustrated and drained.

Even if we genuinely love Christmas – we may miss its most salient point. Content with candles and carols and good food, we bask in the warmth of familiar traditions, in shared acts of kindness, and in feelings of goodwill. We may overlook the harsh realities of Christ's first coming (the dank cave, the cold night, the overbooked inn) as quaint and lovely, rather than bleak and potentially life-threatening.

Mother Teresa once noted that the first person to welcome Christ was John the Baptist, who leaped for joy upon recognizing him, though both of them were still within their mothers' wombs. We, in sharp contrast, are often so dulled by diversions such as TV, the internet, gaming, and the like, that we are incapable of hearing any voice within, let alone attending to it. Life can be so noisy and demanding. Often, the feeling that surrounds us as Christmas cheer lacks a deeper connection to the life-giving spirit of Jesus radiating from the manger because in our world today, Christmas has been very nearly relegated to being a secular event. I encourage you to take time, perhaps in the still, quiet, snow-covered evenings, to rediscover Advent as a season of inward preparation.

Do not allow yourself to miss the essence of Christmas. Meditate upon how Christ's birth took place. Give yourself the gift of sensing that Advent marks something monumental: God's coming into our midst. That coming did not only happen in the past. It is a recurring possibility here and now. And therefore, Advent is not simply a commemorative event or an anniversary, but an annual opportunity for us to consider the future, second Advent -the promised coming of God's kingdom on earth.

The love that descended to Bethlehem is not the insight of a benign God, but a burning fire whose light chases away every shadow, floods every corner, and turns night into day. This Love reveals sin and overcomes it. It conquers darkness with such forcefulness and intensity that it scatters the proud, humbles the mighty, feeds the hungry, and sends the rich away empty-handed (Luke 1:51-53).

A transformation of this scale can not be achieved by human means, but only by divine intervention, Advent (to quote Dietrich Bonhoeffer) might be compared to a prison cell "in which one waits and hopes ...But is completely dependent on the fact that the door of freedom has to be opened from the outside." It is an appropriate metaphor. But that dependency does not release us from responsibility.

The essence of Advent is expectancy, and it is also readiness for action: watchfulness for every opportunity, and willingness to risk it all for freedom and a new beginning.

That is why the imagery of nativity scenes is not adequate to explain the Christmas message. Yes, God was laid into the feeding trough of an animal. But He lay there as far more than an infant. This child was the same man who was crucified on Golgotha, who rose again. Within the manger lies the Cross – and the hope of redemption and resurrection.

For us to recognize this requires reverence, humility, and faith.

We might ask, "What basis do we have for such hope?" Or we might seek instead, to become like little children, and believe. Mary did. So did the shepherds and the wise men of the East. So can each of us, wherever we are. May we be open to experience the true joy and blessings of this season.



This week's Gospel according to: Mark

Jesus said, "When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on the throne of his glory. All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, and he will put the sheep at his right hand and the goats at the left. Then the king will say to those at his right hand, 'Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.' Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?' And the king will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.' Then he will say to those at his left hand, 'You that are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not give me clothing, sick and in prison and you did not visit me.' Then they also will answer, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not take care of you?' Then he will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me.' And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life."
