

A Conversation between The Rev. Charles L. Fischer III and the Rev. Sheleta Fomby

I am blessed to be able to have individuals in my life who are willing to discuss their faith lives. Over the course of my years in ministry, I have met some wonderful people. Recently, I have become acquainted with a powerful preaching sister from Washington, D.C., the Rev. Sheleta E. Fomby. She has become both a friend and a spiritual guide in my life. In a recent conversation, Rev. Fomby and I were discussing how blessed we were in our individual and collective lives. And in a quiet moment, she stated that she lives a great life because she has experienced God's abundance. "If it were not for that, how could she be generous to others."

I was intrigued by her comments and asked for her to explain further. She stated that for her there is a distinct difference between abundance and generosity. "Abundance is what God has made available. And generosity is what we do with what God has made available."

When God created the earth, God deposited upon the earth and gave to its inhabitants all that they would need for survival. God provides more than enough for all to live fully and completely.

Rev. Fomby blessed me with sharing this simple lesson. The more she reflected upon her own life and the lives of those who have poured into her own ministry, I had a moment of understanding the distinction. She was generous in her sharing because of all that others had given to her out of their own abundance. And now the cycle continues because now I can share with others out of the abundance of love, care and prayers that others have showered upon me.

View from the Pew:

This past week we had some furry brown visitors grace us with their presence. These industrious beavers are finding use of one of my favorite maple trees along the waterfront. The lake is al-ready dammed up so there is no need for them to use this wood for that purpose. The small twigs and buds will provide them with food for the winter which they'll store in the water nearby their lodge. The rest they will use to make repairs to their home and building other lodges for their ex-panding family or colony. However, throughout the winter, they will primarily only use one lodge. One of the creeks that feed into the lake comes from a beaver dam, so some must have migrated down here unfortunately.

Unlike bears who will hibernate throughout the winter, beavers will stay active all year round, although they will spend much of the cold season in their den at the top part of the lodge, above water. This section of their home will stay quite a bit warmer than the outside air or water. The mud and sticks together make for very good insulation. When they do venture out, the doorway is under the ice and into the water.





For many other species, and us, with the exception of the more outdoorsy types, we will hunker down in the comfort of our own lodges. Sometimes we have to force ourselves into ac-tion to change the thought process from 'should' to 'want' to do. It is important to keep your brain active and to have a sense of purpose. Just like not exercising your body causes your mus-cles to atrophy, your brain needs to be worked out or exercised as well, before it starts to waste away. If you let things go, they naturally fall into disuse.


