This means that in the morning the angel Gabriel tells Mary she will bear God's son and his name shall be called Emmanuel and by the end of the day she gives birth to Jesus, a bouncing baby boy. I bet all the mom's out there wish that they could have experienced such a speedy pregnancy. I for one am overwhelmed by the fast pace of today's world. We have news 24/7. We can shop 24/7. If we have an issue with one of our credit cards, there's someone from another part of the world on duty to walk us through whatever complication we're experiencing no matter what time of day it is.

To show how used to this I am, I had a problem receiving credit with an online company thanksgiving weekend and I was so frustrated because the specialized department I needed to speak with was closed for the weekend. I have a local bank so they're only available till a certain time of the day and not on weekends. It was a shock to me once when I was traveling, and they couldn't fix my problem with access to my funds until Monday.

Everything now is rush, rush, rush. Those in the workforce today are expected to multitask. It's no longer enough to do your job well, you should also do two or three things at a time well. On Christmas Presents and Mothers

Even as a little guy, I always got Christmas presents for my Mom and Dad. Dad's was the easiest. A hammer, hatchet, or some tool to replace the ones my brother or I lost building shacks the prior summer. Mom's however, was always a little more special. It took a lot of thought. About a week before Christmas, when I was in sixth grade, my father asked me on a Saturday if I had gotten my mother a present. I said not yet but was thinking about it. He suggested I go downtown Pittsburgh to one of the 5 and 10s. He gave me \$5.00 and said he could drive me into town at 4:00 pm on his way to work and I could take the bus home. He even had an unused bus transfer I could use so the ride wouldn't cost anything.

Always lit up at night and exciting, during the holiday season, Pittsburgh, like all cities, was magical. Gimbel's, Horne's, and Kauffman's all had their store windows decorated. Christmas lights were hung all over town. Salvation Army volunteers were ringing their bells on a number of corners, and the stores were all playing Christmas carols. It was an exciting time of year and the light snow added to the ambiance. Perfect present-buying conditions!

After my dad parked at the Monongalia Wharf and we walked to where he worked, I was on my own. I went to McCrory's, Murphy's, Woolworth's, and lastly, Grant's. At Grant's, I noticed something going on in the middle of the store. There, on a raised platform, was a man with a Santa Claus hat on who was selling something. There was a group of people around the platform listening to him. I ambled over and figured out that he was selling a vegetable slicer. It sliced and julienned fruits and vegetables. While talking, he was demonstrating how it worked -- slicing tomatoes paper thin, carrots, and celery – it sliced everything – and fast - zip, zip, zip. It was amazing! It was a Slice-O-Matic and they were on sale for today only for the incredibly low price of only \$4.99. AND if you bought it that day, you got a FREE deluxe crinkle cut French fry blade and wait for it....also a FREE Chop-O-Matic, for all your onion chopping needs. I knew Mom needed one – I had found the perfect present! I raised my hand and was suddenly the center of attention as the salesman pointed me out: "There's a young man who knows a deal when he sees one."

I knew I had made the right decision when the woman who was collecting the money congratulated me on my purchase. BUT, when I went to pay, there was tax and I didn't have any extra. I must have looked so crestfallen that the lady actually reached into her own purse and pulled out some coins to pay for the tax. "Merry Christmas," she said. Carrying it back home on the bus, I smiled all the way. The next night I wrapped it with the free extras and put it under the Christmas tree with the other presents. I couldn't wait until Christmas for her to open it.

Christmas morning we opened our presents after breakfast and I told Mom to open mine first. She opened it and like Mothers since time began, put on a big smile and said she loved it. She said she couldn't wait to use it. Although I was quite pleased with myself at the time, Dad would sit down with me before Christmas next year and give me a life discussion by telling me that men should only give women personal Christmas presents, like jewelry or clothes. It seems I had bought her a broom the year before and he was seeing a pattern!

About forty years later, when we were cleaning out my Dad's house, there in the back of the top shelf in the farthest right cabinet was, yes, you guessed it, the Slice O-Matic, still in its box – obviously unused. I remembered it immediately - she'd kept it all those years! I brought it down, opened it and smiled. There in the bottom was my old present tag in my 6th-grade scrawl -- "To Mom, Merry Christmas, Love Danny."


