View from the Pulpit: Mother Liz

"Out of Wilderness."

The First Sunday of Lent: begins with an Act of Repentance, as we rise as a congregation to publicly confess all our sins and the collective sin of the world. Lent remembers war, violence, hatred, racism, and all abuse that undermines the basic humanity of all who dwell under the umbrella of God's creation.

Our first reading finds Noah, his family, and the Ark at rest, after the Great Flood. Here God makes a Covenant with Noah, that never again will he flood the world. God gives a sign of his love and mercy in the sign of the Rainbow. Lent too, reminds us of our covenant with God through Baptism.

In Peter's First Letter, he reminds us Jesus died for us, to bring us closer to God. Yes, Jesus died in the flesh, but he is very much alive in the spirit. "Do you not know," Peter tells us, "That we are saved through Baptism?"—We journey through the 40 days of Lent, not just that we spiritually die to sin, but that we rise with Christ at Easter and his spirit fills us with hope for the future.

In Lent we are asked to empty ourselves of everything that separates us from the love of God. It is our way of cleaning house, of putting things right, of letting go of our neglect, and restoring that link with God that through Baptism forever ties us to our salvation.

Mark's Gospel gives a rather brief account of Jesus' baptism, in the River Jordan by John. Then Jesus goes into the Wilderness to pray. He stays there for 40 days and nights and is tempted by the devil. We could compare and say that Lent is our Wilderness, in which we seek to be cleansed and renewed. However, most of us know a different kind of Wilderness. Often, we have carried it like a heavy weight down the years. At times it has weighed us down and crippled us.

Divorce and its aftermath, the loss of a child, serious illness, unemployment, homelessness, separation, and at times desperate loneliness, has sapped at our very spirit, torn our hearts, and wrecks our bodies beyond repair. In Lent we pray for healing from the terrible 'wilderness that have often afflicted us and wreaked havoc on our lives. In Lent we need that Rainbow that tells us that we belong to a loving merciful God, who will bring us home, through Wilderness, to his Promised Land.

Hurt, suffering, pain, time often heals, but the memory, guilt from mistakes past, lingers too often in our lives. If there is a gift of the Holy Spirit, that we truly need, it is the gift of Peace. Peace of mind, peace in heart, a peace that will give us true rest. In Lent Christ invites to bury our guilt, hurt, and pain in a deep tomb and to rise, a new person in body and spirit. It is the kingdom of which he speaks in today's Gospel.

Let us in this Lenten Season, truly repent and believe in the good news of Jesus Christ.

Watching her run was pure joy, ears flapping, long legs flying. Riding in the car had to be her favorite treat. Going to visit Grandma with Dad a wonderful almost daily adventure.

Today she had to leave us. Another decision that had to be made; this one will not bring us joy.


