Love's Destination: A Lenten Reflection

ent is a journey, not a destination. It is the ultimate walk in love. As we hear the story of Jesus' physical journey toward Jerusalem and the events of Holy Week, we take our own spiritual journey. We follow that rocky road as our readings walk us through foreshadowing and heartache until we arrive at the foot of the cross.

We are invited on this journey not because we need to suffer as Jesus suffered, but so that we may understand the Grace that comes from living though difficult moments. Jesus models this work, and while he will be martyred and raised, his invitation is not to follow him into death, rather to follow him into the compassion and empathy that come from resisting and crossing over our darkest instincts.

The walk of love teaches us that the path through scarcity and anxiety is in trusting in the abundance we have been shown, the gifts that we have been given.

We are, each of us, given gifts to grow God's Kingdom: kindness, generosity, strength, wisdom, creativity, passion, and so many more. Stewardship reminds us to harness and nurture these gifts so that we might be able to share them more extravagantly with those we meet on our journey.

Questions for Reflection:

As you walk through Lent this year, how will you share your gifts to make the path easier for others?

Strike Three

I was always told that if I was going to drink alcohol to do it responsibly. One time when I was 16 or 17, we went "camping", which was my and my friends cover for party. Drinking under age was the first first strike. Alcohol does not mix well with too many things unless you follow the responsibility rule. We gathered all the camping essentials together - sleeping bags, a change of underwear, some snacks, and of course a case of cheep beer - and drove up to this pasture. Within it contained a very large dead elm tree which we called the Lone Tree, the perfect spot to make camp. You could see it in the middle of this field for quite some distance. We built a very respectable camp fire (not quite bon fire style as we didn't want to bring notice to our-selves. Fire and alcohol - strike two. These two can spell disaster together if not following rule one, which we definitely were not. The festivities slowed down after midnight at some point. I placed my sleeping bag nice and cozy near the camp fire and fell right to sleep. I woke up just as the sky was lighting up in the east. It was a bit foggy out and I couldn't quite see clearly (I'm pretty sure that really was fog and not some hungover state of mind). I then became aware of this distinct burning hair smell. My senses began to sharpen and I quickly did a self inventory to see if all my hair was still in place and not all curlicued from the campfire. I seemed to be all ok but then I looked down at my sleeping bag and it had these burnt pock marks all over it. This was almost three strikes your out for me. I found out that I had fallen asleep about two feet from the campfire, and when the wind picked up overnight, sparks and embers showered all over me. When getting everything cleaned up that morning, I made sure that I rolled the sleeping bag, burnt side in and when I got home, quietly put it back in the attic. Fortunately, I think my mom's camping days were long in the past, and to my knowledge, no-one ever used that bag since. I sure know that I didn't.



Easter Flowers 2


Check these out. They're blooming. They grew from the Easter flowers that were on the altar and are distributed after Easter.


They are from the last two Easters.
