View from the Pew:

Sounds of Music

This past Sunday, we were graced with an absolutely wonderful musical performance at the Montrose First Presbyterian Church, which was presented by the Madrigal Singers of Wyoming Seminary College Preparatory School in Kingston, Pennsylvania. Music can be a lot of things. One of those is inspirational, which in this case was for me. At the risk of being repetitive, some of the introductory remarks I made there you will see again here. Speaking and writing use different parts of the brain. Speaking can tend to be more impromptu and writing to be more polished. In other words, you may get something a bit different now than you did on Sunday.

In Navy boot camp, I was fortunate enough to land a job with the choir which was a wonderful reprieve from the daily berating or receiving some sort of arduous physical "training". One day one of our company commanders told us that they could pick two of us out of 80 to join the choir. One other recruit and I gave on the spot auditions - mine was a brief rendition of Moon River in a tenor operatic manner. The whole company, including the usually unhumored commander, burst out laughing - not because it was bad, but so unexpected from my normal quiet self. Music gave me a much needed mental break. It even saved me from getting gassed. While I was out singing with the choir on the parade field, the rest of the company was being subjected to the effects of tear gas in the gas chamber. I was utterly happy with my new vocation.

Music has the power to evoke a myriad of emotions. Even the same song in two different renderings can bring out different feelings such as Killing me Softly. The older version is more melodic and the newer one has more bouncy and catchy rhythms to it. Some music was written expressly to elicit feelings of loyalty or patriotism such as alma maters (school songs), coming from the Latin fostering mother, as well as national anthems. Some songs were written as an escape from traumatic life experiences, like those experiencing slavery. Swing Low Sweet Chariot by Etta James was depiction of the Jordan River as representative of the first step to freedom from slavery in earlier U. S. history. The chariot is a metaphor for escaping to freedom. This week, we even used music to uplift the spirits of the residents of Meadow View. Sometimes we choose the music to suit our mood and sometimes the music creates our mood. For example, you may be driving down the country road listening to a nice relaxing piece of classical music which puts you at ease, then along comes some muscle car with weight-lifting, pumping music at 90 decibels. This brings out the the bull pawing the dirt ready to charge feeling. But, probably to this other driver, it energizes them and prevents them from falling asleep at the wheel.

And finally, we still have a music program here at Saint Paul's with the talented pianist, Penny Jaggars, and of course with the lovely accompaniment of Mother Liz's vocals, which keep us happily singing along during morning services.
