View from the Pulpit: Mother Liz

St. Paul's Little Free Pantry on Chestnut Street is up and running. I will bless the pantry and all those who give and receive of its bounty on Sunday immediately after the Eucharist. I am overjoyed that I have gotten to see this project through to completion before my departure.

Thank you to all who have helped in bringing this ministry to its fruition. Special thanks to those who procured the pantry, who reinvented it, who filled it, and those who will maintain it. If you would like to contribute to the inventory, we have handouts available on the inside of the door for your convenience. Please stick to the guidelines provided and keep it simple. Important note, we do not put out cans at times of extreme hot or cold temperatures and nothing in glass containers. If you have any questions about donations, please contact Wanda Peirce as she has agreed to head up this ministry. Special thanks to her and to Mary Zalewski who will be keeping an eye on the pantry on a regular basis.

I have been reflecting quite a bit about our time together, brief as it has been. It brings up many emotions for me. I think leaving a congregation must be one of the most difficult things we clergy must do. Surely there are many difficult things with which clergy are faced during their active clerical service, but departing a congregation, no matter the situation, is uniquely challenging.

I recall my first vestry meeting while I was still a deacon. Tom said to me before the meeting, "We are a family and we are here for each other." And honestly, that was my first impression of everyone at St. Paul's when I attended a Sunday service before my diaconal ordination. I felt your loving arms around me right from the start. You are the body of Christ; his hands, his feet, his heart, and you welcome the stranger with open arms. That said, no one is perfect. We are all merely mortal. We've had our differences and miscommunication at times, however, it in no way diminishes the Christ-like attitude present in this parish. Despite our faults, we have actively engaged in spreading the Good News of Jesus Christ crucified, buried, and risen from the dead for our redemption. We do our best to witness to the unconditional love of God for all of his beloved children. As we step out into the unknown, may we have faith that God will provide for us in good times and in bad, living fully each and every moment until we are called home one day to the mansion prepared for us with the Triune God. Let us continue to work for the coming of the Kingdom, here and hereafter. May we persevere in the sure and certain hope that, as Julian of Norwich proclaimed, all shall be well, all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well.

You shall remain in my heart and in my prayers as I leave this blessed place. Finally, I will share the words of Henri-Frédéric Amiel, "Life is short. We don't have much time to gladden the hearts of those who walk this way with us. So, be swift to love and make haste to be kind."

View from the Pew:

Garrison Keillor on Episcopalians ... An essay:

We make fun of Episcopalians for their blandness, their excessive calm, their fear of giving offense, their lack of speed and also for their secret fondness for macaroni and cheese. But nobody sings like them. If you were to ask an audience in Des Moines, a relatively Episcopalianless place, to sing along on the chorus of "Michael Row the Boat Ashore," they will look daggers at you as if you had asked them to strip to their underwear. But if you do this among Episcopalians, they'd smile and row that boat ashore and up on the beach!And down the road!

Many Episcopalians are bred from childhood to sing in four-part harmony, a talent that comes from sitting on the lap of someone singing alto or tenor or bass and hearing the harmonic intervals by putting your little head against that person's rib cage. It's natural for Episcopalians to sing in harmony. We are too modest to be soloists, too worldly to sing in unison. When you're singing in the key of C and you slide into the A-7th and D-7th chords, all two hundred of you, it's an emotionally fulfilling moment. By our joining in harmony, we somehow promise that we will not forsake each other.

I do believe this, people: Episcopalians, who love to sing in four-part harmony are the sort of people you could call up when you're in deep distress. If you are dying, they will comfort you. If you are lonely, they'll talk to you. And if you are hungry, they'll give you tuna salad!

Episcopalians believe in prayer, but would practically die if asked to pray out loud. Episcopalians like to sing, except when confronted with a new hymn or a hymn with more than four stanzas.

Episcopalians believe their Rectors will visit them in the hospital, even if they don't notify them that they are there. Episcopalians usually follow the official liturgy and will feel it is their way of suffering for their sins. Episcopalians believe in miracles and even expect miracles, especially during their stewardship visitation programs or when passing the plate.

Episcopalians feel that applauding for their children's choirs will not make the kids too proud and conceited.

Episcopalians think that the Bible forbids them from crossing the aisle while passing the peace. Episcopalians drink coffee as if it were the Third Sacrament. Episcopalians feel guilty for not staying to clean up after their own wedding reception in the Fellowship Hall.

Episcopalians are willing to pay up to one dollar for a meal at church. Episcopalians still serve Jell-O in the proper liturgical color of the season and Episcopalians believe that it is OK to poke fun at themselves and never take themselves too seriously.

And finally, you know you are a Episcopalian when:

- -It's 100 degrees, with 90% humidity, and you still have coffee after the service.
- -You hear something really funny during the sermon and smile as loudly as you can.
- -Donuts are a line item in the church budget, just like coffee.
- When you watch a Star Wars movie and they say, "May the Force be with you," and you re-spond, "and also with you."
- And lastly, it takes ten minutes to say good-bye
