# View from the Pulpit: Father Bill

#### "Come Lord Jesus!"

Jesus in his teaching spoke, a number of times, about the 'Kingdom of God.' At one stage he compared it to a 'Mustard Seed', which although the smallest seed, grows into the largest bush. I always thought, the next part, was somehow overlooked: "and it gives shelter to all the birds of the air."

We live in an age of negative news, about churches and Christianity. Talk of a declining church, low attendance, has filled the news media, ever since Covid 19. —Yet, Jesus also teaches in Parables, about the 'threshing floor' of the barn. Here the wheat is gathered after the harvest, and the wheat seed is separated from the chaff! Again, he teaches of the servants coming to the master, to complain that an 'enemy' has sewn 'tares' among the wheat, and should they now rip them out of the field.

All these teachings speak of the kingdom of God, with Jesus knowing what is to come. We are in a similar situation today. We are rapidly, becoming the 'anawim', the faithful few, who waited the coming of the Messiah, before Jesus' birth. I believe our prayer should be: "Come Lord Jesus!" ---It is one of the earliest prayers of the First Century church. "Iesus Christus Dominus est!" ---Jesus Christ is Lord. "Come Lord Jesus into our hearts, and like the mustard seed bring us change, not for our sake but for those who would shelter in the strength of this faith and your word."

How can we get away from the idea that salvation is about numbers? Even that church is about numbers. Jesus did not say that. He said: "Where two or three are gathered in my name, there I will be."—In Penal Times, Christians gathered in small numbers, in order not to attract attention. They gathered in homes, basements, on the shore, and around a flat rock, in the hills. In England, large mansions had a secret room, often built into a wall where the 'Mass' could be celebrated.

For Fifty (50) long years, Christians in Eastern Europe and in Russia, survived the brutality of Communism, including the purges of Joseph Starlin, in Poland, Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Bulgaria, Romania, Estonia, Eastern Germany and Yugoslavia. Churches were closed, priests banned, bishops imprisoned, Christians fined, yet they survived. Today we need to pray for the 'Church of Tomorrow'. –Smaller, devout, archival, witnessing, faithful, resolute, prayerful. Like the Planet 'Foundation,' in Asimov's "Foundation Trilogy," we need to map out our own future. We need plant the seed of the Kingdom of God. We do not as 'church,' exist for ourselves. We exist to proclaim the Gospel, and the kingdom of Heaven. Do that, and we will have done all we need to do. The Spirit will do the rest. Amen.


# Last Week's Service and Events

#### Old Photo of the Presbyterian Church

Here's what the Presbyterian Church looked like about 1900. This was their second church and was built in 1861 on the site of the original 1824 one, only four years after St. Paul's current church was built. It's generally conceded that it was built to outdo St. Paul's (1857/58) and it was stipulated that it's steeple would be higher than ours. However, there were no tall trees in Montrose at that time and in January of 1898, a lighting bolt hit the tip of their steeple sending it through the roof and causing a ten foot hole. So much for having the highest steeple with metal on it!
