View from the Pulpit:

Father Bill

"Prophet."

John the Baptist was foremost a 'Prophetic Preacher!' He belonged to a longer tradition of prophets, from Israel's past. People constantly get the role of the prophet wrong. The Prophet did not foretell the future. A Prophet 'made sense of the present, in the light of the past.' Forget about all the Prophets of Israel, prior to the time Israel settled in the land of Canaan. Abraham, Moses, Jacob, were a different kind of Prophet. No, the Prophets we want to concentrate on are the Prophets who came after the Kingdom of Israel, split North and South, around the year 921bc.

You see, Prophets were men on a mission. Their mission was twofold. First, they worked to convince Israel to return to the worship of Yahweh, and to keep his Covenant and Laws. Secondly, they believed that a return to the Covenant and the Law of Moses had been made so much more difficult since the breakup of the kingdom of David and Solomon.

The Kingdom had broken into two, North and South. As the kingdoms of Israel in the North, and Judah in the South, the 12 tribes could never be united again around the Ark of the Covenant. The split would forever condemn the nation to be slaves, to every conquering force and neighbor. ---The Prophets wanted to see a United Kingdom, but knew this was only possible, if Israel repented, rejected sin, and the ways of their neighbors, and returned to keeping commandments and laws, as in the days of old.

There arose among the Seven and Six century Prophets, a hope. We call it a 'Messianic hope', that one would come, sent by God, who would lead Israel back to Yahweh, and back to a new kingdom. This one they named 'the Messiah.'---This was the beginning of 'Prophetic Preaching.' Let me give you an example.

The word of God came to Amos, a farmer in the Southern Kingdom of Judah. Yahweh speaks to him, and commissions him, to go to Bethel, the Northern shrine of the Canaanites. He is to convince Israelites to reject a life of wealth, and prosperity, and return to the Covenant. For Bethel was the Temple of the fertility God, Baal, a place of sin, sacred prostitution, and the nightlife, that seduced the youth of Israel. His message began with – 'Repent!'

Prophetic Preaching calls for 'repentance and a return to God, faith, and God's law.' –Today, in a world of greed, wealth, power, corruption, repentance, is not high on the list of priorities for any politician, political leader, dictator, general, admiral, or billionaire. Sad to say, it is not on any list of the godless, gambler, alcoholic, spouse abuser, child abuser, thief, murderer or criminal neither. 'Repentance does not make its way on to the Silver Screen, Movies, Television, or social media. You will not find it on 'Facebook' or the front Page of the Local Paper.

Repent-means to 'go back'; change your ways; reform; become better; turn things around; embrace goodness; virtue; become a better person; reach out to others; -- repentance is the very essence of 'being a Christian!'—When did you last hear that, being preached in your church?---Repent. Begin today. Drop a habit. Correct a mistake. Heal a wound. Reconcile with an enemy. Forgive another. Go out and love, in all you say and do. —'Prophetic Preaching'----can never be undervalued.-----Amen.






This week's Gospel according to: Mark

Jesus set out and went away to the region of Tyre. He entered a house and did not want anyone to know he was there. Yet he could not escape notice, but a woman whose little daughter had an unclean spirit immediately heard about him, and she came and bowed down at his feet. Now the woman was a Gentile, of Syrophoenician origin. She begged him to cast the demon out of her daughter. He said to her, "Let the children be fed first, for it is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." But she answered him, "Sir, even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs." Then he said to her, "For saying that, you may go the demon has left your daughter." So she went home, found the child lying on the bed, and the demon gone.

Then he returned from the region of Tyre, and went by way of Sidon towards the Sea of Galilee, in the region of the Decapolis. They brought to him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they begged him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, and put his fingers into his ears, and he spat and touched his tongue. Then looking up to heaven, he sighed and said to him, "Ephphatha," that is, "Be opened." And immediately his ears were opened, his tongue was released, and he spoke plainly. Then Jesus ordered them to tell no one; but the more he ordered them, the more zealously they proclaimed it. They were astounded beyond measure, saying, "He has done everything well; he even makes the deaf to hear and the mute to speak."
