View from the Pulpit: Father Bill

"In God We Trust"

The 2nd Sunday of Lent brings into our midst the word 'covenant'. And we see it first, in the Book of Genesis, where Abraham is tied to a covenant with Yahweh. Both Abraham and Paul in the second reading, to the Philippians, share a deep concern and even pessimism, that can only be abated by the God they choose to believe in. For Abraham, there is no meaning to his life without an heir. For Paul there is only Christ, and another world different from the 'godlessness' he witnesses all around him. Abraham is promised heirs, as many as the stars in the sky, while Paul begs his Christians to stand firm, and believe in an eternal kingdom.

In the Gospel, from Luke 13, Jesus is also beset by those who oppose him and would want him dead. Yet it is clear, that he will not be moved from his Father's work, until the time is right. Neither death, or threats, will move him away from the mission he must accomplish. He too has a covenant, and it will not be broken by the will of any man. Everywhere today, we hear of widespread concern both in the world, and in our nation. Our neighbors are not happy, and in the country, half are discontented, while the other half celebrates. We have never been so polarized, and divided, as we are today. Yet, no one ever stops to ask: "Is it because we have become a Godless nation"? Abraham found no happiness, till he found his God. Paul was a murderer, and a scourge of Christians, until he found Christ. Today, when only the old attend any church; when religion is ridiculed on Talk Shows; when profanity, curse words, are openly spoke, on television and Film, when nakedness, and sex is openly displayed, we know one thing for certain. Decency, values, principles and honor are heading to Hell in a handbasket. Do not point fingers at children and say that they no longer have the values of the 'Greatest Generation'! They have the values that we give them and educate them to today. Point the finger at today's adults, who have decided that they have no need of God in their lives, and can get along fine without him, his church or his Gospel. Now step back and take a long hard look: we have a godless government, that extends to all parties; a godless education system, that teaches no godly values; and our entertainment industry and media is a disgrace.

Show me instead a James Stuart, a Ronald Reagan, a Dorothy Hart or a Billy Graham. Show me people of their standard, and character, who both loved their country, and their God, and clearly had a covenant with both. Show me! Show me a man like Harry S. Truman, our 33rd President, much admired as a statesman by all sides. Show me. Somehow, someway, sometime, we have to put God back in the equation of our lives, both personally and nationally. We must begin to love God again. Do not tell me you love America, when you hate half the population of Americans. Tell me that because you love God, you love all Americans, and in loving all, you love the values that are God's values. Then we can all say with pride: "In God we Trust!" This is our covenant. Amen.


