View from the Pulpit: The Rev. Susan Treanor

Dear Grace Family and Friends—

This past Sunday, Deacon Joe shared a book meaningful to him called The Boy, the Mole, the Fox and the Horse by Charlie Mackey. The wisdom of this short, beautiful book reminds us that the Holy Spirit does, in fact, work through many channels, including those of art, music, and literature. Mackey's book reminds me in some ways of another favorite book from my childhood, The Little Prince, which, though not religious, was certainly instrumental in my own spiritual development. At one point, the Boy says to the Mole, "I wonder if there is a school of unlearning."

For me, coming to The Episcopal Church was very much like coming to a school of unlearning —unlearning the ideas that God was vengeful, judgmental, or exclusionary. Or that God only loved certain kinds of people, or who believed all the same way, or agreed about everything. Living in Christian community with others who aren't just like us can be challenging, but once you've unlearned the ways of religious division and extremism that so many of us were taught growing up, you just can't go back.

Thanks to all of you for choosing to be part of a church that accommodates a wide range of beliefs under the umbrella of "common prayer" rather than rigid doctrine. As we "strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being," we offer a refuge to those who may be searching for a "school of unlearning."

And for those of us who may have been told we are "less than" because of who we are, I leave us with one more quote from Mackey's book:

"So you know all about me?" asked the boy.

"Yes," said the horse.

"And you still love me?"

"We love you all the more."

This week's Gospel according to: John

Jesus and his disciples arrived at the country of the Gerasenes, which is opposite Galilee. As he stepped out on land, a man of the city who had demons met him. For a long time he had worn no clothes, and he did not live in a house but in the tombs. When he saw Jesus, he fell down before him and shouted at the top of his voice, "What have you to do with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I beg you, do not torment me" -- for Jesus had commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man. (For many times it had seized him; he was kept under guard and bound with chains and shackles, but he would break the bonds and be driven by the demon into the wilds.) Jesus then asked him, "What is your name?" He said, "Legion"; for many demons had entered him. They begged him not to order them to go back into the abyss.

Now there on the hillside a large herd of swine was feeding; and the demons begged Jesus to let them enter these. So he gave them permission. Then the demons came out of the man and entered the swine, and the herd rushed down the steep bank into the lake and was drowned.

When the swineherds saw what had happened, they ran off and told it in the city and in the country. Then people came out to see what had happened, and when they came to Jesus, they found the man from whom the demons had gone sitting at the feet of Jesus, clothed and in his right mind. And they were afraid. Those who had seen it told them how the one who had been possessed by demons had been healed. Then all the people of the surrounding country of the Gerasenes asked Jesus to leave them; for they were seized with great fear. So he got into the boat and returned. The man from whom the demons had gone begged that he might be with him; but Jesus sent him away, saying, "Return to your home, and declare how much God has done for you." So he went away, proclaiming throughout the city how much Jesus had done for him.

MID-JUNE IN SUSQUEHANNA COUNTY

It's late spring in Susquehanna County and it's still raining. The tomatoes don't like it nor does anyone who cuts their grass. Blackberries are flowering, they will be ready to pick and eat while hiking in August. This blacksnake just wiped out the bird box and the four fledgling tree swallows were the meal. He was removed to a farm in Bradford County. That evil, invasive, but beautiful thorn bush, multi flora rose, is blooming and you can see how much it has spread along the road and in the fields. The rain hasn't hurt the clematis but there is an amazing array of fungi growing. First haying is being done but the hay is wet and the brown field where cut turns green in a day. It's mid-June here in Susquehanna County.
