View from the Pulpit: The Rev. Susan Treanor

Dear Brothers and Sisters:

I am elated at the way this community cared for and about Harry and Wanda. This care continued and was evident in the preparation for Harry's celebration of life. I hope the love all of you had for both Harry and Wanda eased the pain that everyone felt at Harry's death. You exemplified Jesus' instruction to love our neighbor.

We are making some changes to the office hours. Averly is getting or has gotten to the stage where she sleeps less than her old normal, is very vocal and wants a lot of interaction. Her third tooth finally has appeared. Kate has arranged child care for her for four days a week. Kate's work schedule will be flexible in that if she has finished her work in three days, she will only work three days that week. If not finished she will have a four-day week. The office hour signs on the doors will reflect this summer schedule.

You may know that I will be on vacation until July16th. I am flying to Dublin, will spend some time in the Long Room at Trinity College. This library, built (between 1712 and 1732) had a flat plaster ceiling and shelving for books on the lower level only, with an open gallery. By the 1850s these shelves had become completely full; largely as since 1801 the Library had been given the right to claim a free copy of every book published in Britain and Ireland. The library houses 200,000 books and many sculptures. This goes against what I thought about the Irish people in that I basically thought they were illiterate. I do not know if either my grandparents could read or write or ever went to school. I've told many of you that my father's answer to my questions about what it was to be Irish was: "You're not Irish, you're American." I am now fascinated by Irish Theology which rejects the idea of original sin and the idea that Jesus paid his life to ransom us. Celtic spirituality is also very centered in protecting creation.

After Dublin, I am driving to the west coast to the village where my grandfather grew up and farmed. I've been there once and want to see if I can arrange for the Celtic Cross where my great grandparents and other family members are buried in the town cemetery can be cleaned. Right now names are obscured by mold. I also hope to revisit some of the six or seven Maloney families who live on main street. All of whom say they were never related.

Week after that I am meeting some friends from Jeff. And we are spending a week exploring Wales with friends who have relocated there. I will try not to be exhausted when I come back home. I hope you have a wonderful July 4th celebration. I intend not to miss that next year. Rev. Susan

Get Outta Here!

Mothers' and Fathers' Days always get me thinking about my parents. It's occurred to me often that it's hard for us I believe to think of them, or any of our elders, as ever being young or particularly in pre-Title IX days, mother's doing sports. They were always older, and always parents. We went to my youngest granddaughter's gymnastic regional event in Massachusetts this spring. While watching and taking multiple pictures and videos with our iPhones, I got to sit and talk with her older sister, now a sophomore, who runs track. She is apparently pretty good. I asked her how she was doing, what her times were, what events she liked the best, etc. As the conversation went on, I mentioned that Grammy used to run track and that's probably where she gets her talent from. She laughed: "Get outta here!"

Back track to 1957. My brother, who was five years older than I (World War II intervened), decided to run track in 9th grade. He told us this at the dinner table and explained how tryouts would work etc. My mother was pleased and mentioned nonchalantly that she had run track in high school. After an amazed look at each other across the table, my brother and I broke out into a fit of laughter. "Get outta here!" It never occurred to us that our mother was ever an athlete - mothers weren't athletes – mothers were mothers.

Well, that night, my mother disappeared into the attic and dug out her 1939 Homestead High School yearbook. Called the Homesteader, it was a gold-covered standard high school yearbook with all the usual sections. She made us sit down on the couch on either side of her and look at it. Annotated by her classmates with standard yearbook fare, "Good luck Jen," "You're the best," "We've been together since first grade," etc., there was one that said: "...he was a bum anyhow." (What was that all about?) Anyway, she turned the page to the Athletics section, and yup, by golly, that was her. There she was in a group picture of the 1938-39 Homestead High School women's track team with all the women in their funny-looking track uniforms. Track and basketball were apparently the only women's sports at the school. I had never seen a high school picture of her, but it was her. Letting us look, she turned the page to the book to a smaller picture in a collage of athletes during games and, "There", she said, "me handing the baton to another track team member." The second one wasn't a great picture and you couldn't make out exactly who the runner was, but we believed her.

"Well, what do you think of your old mother now?" she said. "Hah!" We all laughed. We spent the rest of the night going through it, laughing at the annotations, the funny nicknames, the kids' clothes, and the girls' hairdos. As we looked through the book, she told stories about her classmates on the pages and about running on the team. And at the end of the night, my view of my mother had changed. Who would have thunk it – my Mom in a track uniform and a runner? I must admit, I still have trouble picturing it. In all the time I knew her, I never saw her run anywhere!

But fast forward back to Massachusetts. "Well, if you don't believe me go ask Grammy." So she did. She went up to her grandmother and asked her if she really ran track. "Yes, I did, mostly relays or long distance. I wasn't a sprinter like you. I was also on the girl's high school lacrosse team and played field hockey." "Oh, and I was on Pitt's field hockey team too." Next time you visit, I'll get out my yearbook. My granddaughter looked at me and I said, "Well, what do you think of your old Grammy now?" "Hah!" We both laughed. But I saw her a little later looking at her grandmother in a new light.

I guess the moral is if you did any sports before phone cameras were invented, and may need to prove it, you should make sure you know where those old yearbooks are.
