View from the middle aisle:

I want to apologize to everyone who has been coming to Tuesday Night Compline. I simply did not realize that yesterday was Tuesday, so I sent out no invitation and did not connect to Zoom last night. I have to figure out a better way to do this. I already put it in my calendar for next Tuesday. Secondly, we made the announcement that that Church of England, a co member with us of the Anglican Communion, has chosen the next Archbishop of Canterbury: Bishop Sarah Mullally. She will be consecrated this coming March.

The Archbishop's position in the Church of England is the "first among Peers", that is, they have no power over other Anglican Bishops in England other than influence. However, other provinces, I am thinking Provinces in Africa who themselves may have greater authority than our structure gives our Bishops, and who have tried to get the previous Archbishops of Canterbury to step into our provinces over ordination of Gay men and women as deacons, priests and bishops for instance, may have difficulty supporting a female Archbishop of Canterbury. Let us keep her in our prayers as she takes on this new role.

The Church of England consecrated its first women priests in 1994 and consecrated its first female bishop in January of 2015. There are now 33 women bishops out of 69 bishops in total. This is quite a jump in 10 years. There are 42 diocese in the Church of England, 2 diocese have not filled their open positions yet, so there are 40 bishops diocesan, of these, I believe 10 are women.

The United States consecrated its first female priest in 1977 and consecrated Barbara Harris a Bishop in 1988.

Thirdly, as I have had one-on-one meetings with many of you, I am astounded by the wealth of experience we have in this parish. This area included administration, accounting, communication and many others. Communication is a passion of mine. That does not mean to say I can't improve my own communication, it is more to say I see how important it is to our common life, deepening and growth. We are planning to have a presentation on communication, hopefully in October after coffee hour. Part of what I want to remind myself and us is that looking at the same issue, we may interpret it in many different ways: 360 or more in fact. It is easy to forget that and assume everyone is looking at the same thing, interprets it as a problem or blessing, offers identical ideas to solve or build on the gift and wonders why everyone does not agree with us. The more we understand our own approach to everything, the more we can begin to understand ourselves and others. I hope you will take advantage of this opportunity that our members are offering us to enhance our communication and therefore our community.

The Diocese of NY is offering a conversation on "Space of Belonging and Thriving" with the Very Rev. Bishop Marian Budde and Poet theologian Padraig O Tuama, moderated by NY Bishop Allen K Shin. It will be available free on line to those who register. I can send you a link.

My calendar is still open to meeting anyone who has not yet had a one-on-or anyone who wants a second.
